

What baggage do we carry with us? Do we carry resent-



ALEX AND THE LIONS(CLUB)

We have all heard the story from the Old Testament about Daniel and the lions' den, but you may not be familiar with the story of Alex and the Lions. I know you are acquainted with Alex Gibson. He is that handsome young fellow who is the brother of Emilie, the son of Trey and Candi and the grandson of Linda and Mike Endicott. This is about a chapter from his life when he was only four years old. All he really remembers about what happened is that he didn't have to wear glasses anymore, and he could see so much better than he had before.

The story about Alex and the Lions begins a long time before Alex was born. In fact, it started 100 years ago when a man named Melvin Jones founded the Lions Club International in 1917 as a non-political service organization. Lions Clubs now include over 46,000 local clubs with more than 1.4 million members in over 200 countries. It is the largest civic club organization in the world. Their aim is to meet the needs of communities on both a local and global scale. Our own parishioner, Paul Moore, has served as president of three different Lions Clubs and in 2006 was District Governor of District 8-L which is all of Northwest Louisiana, 32 clubs. He even began the BPCC Campus Club.

I cannot begin to tell you about their wide variety of service projects from donations to hospices to donations to disaster victims all over the world, surpassing \$1 million. The Lions World Sight Day is dedicated to drawing attention to the plight of sight loss in Third World Countries. The Lions' focus on work for the blind began when Helen Keller addressed the Lions' convention in Cedar Point, lowa, on June 30, 1925, and charged the members to be "Knights of the Blind."

As part of their interest and concern in the importance of good sight for all, the Lions have worked on projects designed to prevent blindness, restore eyesight and improve eye health and eye care for hundreds of millions of people worldwide. "Sight" is one of the Lions defining causes. And as part of their mission, vision screening is performed to identify possible vision problems. Lions partner with eye care professionals to carry out joint screening events such as a program called Cubsite which tests daycare children to check for eye problems. Ah, ha, you may say, is this where Alex comes in? Yes!

In 2007, Alex was four years old and attending Cypress Run Day Care. The Lions Club did a screening and found a cloudy spot in Alex's left eye. That spot turned out to be a cataract, possibly caused by steroids administered when he was a newborn. He had laser surgery to remove the cataract in his eye and more surgery to remove the scar tissue.



So unlike Daniel's story, Alex's story has Lions as heroes, not wild beasts. Though it's been awhile ago for Alex, he says: "Thanks to the Lions Club for helping to find my problem. I wouldn't have been able to read or to do art."(He is in the Talented Arts Program in Bossier) "It certainly has made my life easier and changed it for the better." I would like to add that Alex is a straight A student, and he loves to read.

And if you're like me, you love happy endings!

IN MEMORIAM LILLIAN RUTH GREEN STOCKINGER

Many wonderful people have passed through the portals of St. James through the years, and one of my favorites was Ruth Stockinger. Ruth always seemed to be in good spirits with a sparkle in her eyes and a witty comment on her lips. Sadly, Ruth died on January 27 of this year at the age of 88. It has just been 10 months since her husband, Alden, died at the age of 90. His funeral was at St. James on March 7, 2016. They were married for 67 years.



You may remember the story of how the Stockingers with their three children originally came to St. James. Before we had a church building, St. James consisted of our parish hall which served as church, Sunday school rooms, office, etc. One day David Stockinger, Ruth and Al's son, was riding by the church on the two-lane Flournoy Lucas (now 4 lane Bert Kouns) when he saw the priest (Father Wallace Garrett) trying to put out a grass fire. The boys stopped and helped put the fire out, and Father Garrett invited them in for a coke. A few days later, the Stockinger doorbell rang. Ruth went to the door and called to David: "There's an Episcopal priest here looking for you." Father Garrett was at the door to invite the whole family to visit St. James. And they came! The whole family was confirmed and became parishioners on May 18, 1969, with Sally joining them on May 10, 1970.

Ruth was born on February 1, 1928, in Pittsburg, Kansas and Ruth and Al met at Pittsburg State College. They later moved to Shreveport with Al's work with the railroad. She is survived by her three children: David C. Stockinger (who is married to one of St. James own, Lynda Kizer, sister of Marty Wainwright and Alexis Houston); Betsy Bell and her husband David; and Sally David. She is also survived by a sister, Esther Socolofsky, 9 grandchildren, and 12 great grandchildren with 2 more on the way.

Ruth was an outstanding educator and school administrator. She began her lengthy teaching career in a one room school house in Paola, Kansas. She spent most of her career as a teacher and principal at Agnew Town and Country Day School. As the mother of a child who went to Agnew, I remember so well the wonderful reputation that Ruth had as a first grade teacher, undoubtedly the most difficult grade to teach. Ruth's pupils not only learned quickly and well; they also absolutely loved their teacher. She went on to become an excellent and beloved principal.

Ruth and AI especially enjoyed their life on the road as "Airstreamers"; she even became the International Recording Secretary for the Airstream International Travel Club. Ruth had so many interests: china painting, garden club, music (her violin) sports and especially her grands.

A memorial service was held on February 3, 2017, at the First Methodist Church of Shreveport with internment beside her husband AI in the Garden of Memories Cemetery, Pittsburg, Kansas. Those of us who knew Ruth will always remember that charming and lovely lady; I know she is with AI again.

A LENT IS UPON US again to prepare For many Christians the preparation includes self.

Lent is upon us again—a time to prepare. For many Christians the preparation includes selfsacrifice. For others it is a time to form new habits, reaching out to others, taking on additional charitable works, or donating time or money to a good cause. In this age of social media and constant access to electronic communication, I'd like to propose a melding of the above.

We have the unique opportunity to touch the lives of many more people today than ever before either for the better...or not. We can display love and caring or mockery and disdain. We can uplift or tear apart. And we can do it all from the comfort and anonymity of our own homes. Best or worst of all, we can do it without even realizing the end product of our choices and actions.

I propose that for this Lenten season we approach our on-line interactions in a deliberate and thoughtful manner, considering how what we type affects others. Are the words we are choosing building others up, raising their self-esteem and self-worth or causing them pain? Are we choosing to say things that we would be proud to repeat in front of our mothers, priests, and children? Are we considering who may be reading what we write and how it may be affecting their view of us what they believe we represent?

The Good Lord absolutely knows I am not perfect at this (or anything else)—and that is why I am making this proposal. This is an area where I can use some improvement, and I am inviting everyone to join me in the journey. KAIROS COOKIES

Cookies are an important part of the Kairos weekend and our team will be taking over 1,500 dozen homebaked cookies into the prison. Baking cookies is a practical way we can show God's love to those incarcerated. Their impact is tremendous as residents realize that someone who doesn't even know them would take their own time to make something just for them.

Please follow the guidelines below—we can only take undamaged (unbroken) cookies inside and we must also follow Department of Corrections rules regarding food. These guidelines are time-tested to ensure success.

- 1. Cookies must not require refrigeration.
- 2. No liquor or liquor flavoring may be used.
- 3. Any kind of topping is O.K. except: frosting that might spoil and powdered or granulated sugar.
- 4. Cookies should be about $2\frac{1}{2} 3$ " in diameter and be sturdy enough to be handled without breaking.
- 5. Cookies must not contain any kind of fruit.
- 6. Cookies must be completely cooled before packing. If they are not, they tend to stick together or spoil in storage.
- 7. Pack each dozen cookies in a separate zip-top bag. Four stacks of three cookies fit well in a quart-sized bag. Gently squeeze out as much air as possible before sealing the bag.
- 8. Please identify the cookie type on the outside of the bag (chocolate chip, peanut butter, etc.), but don't mark anything that identifies individuals.
- 9. Please turn in cookies to Brian Whatley. Cookies may be left in the Parish Hall on a designated table shortly before the next Kairos weekend, March 17-19, 2017.
