## A MESSAGE FROM MARGARET

As we enter April, we look toward Palm Sunday, Holy Week and Easter. For myself, I find the more intentional I am about walking the week from Palm Sunday through Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Holy Saturday, and Easter, the more meaning I derive from the journey. I think the same thing happens in life, the more intentional I am in walking through suffering, the deeper the experience is on the other side.



Walking through suffering allows us to develop deep relationship, foster skills to deal with stress and disap-

pointment, deepen our relationship with God, and deepen our appreciation of the strengths God has placed within us.

It takes courage to be authentic, to be vulnerable in life. I cannot imagine **what went through Jesus' mind as he walked from a triumphant entry,** then before Pilate and Caiaphas, and ultimately to the cross in the course of a week. When I feel overwhelmed in life, I take a page from the Garden of Gethsemane; I take time to pray in quiet to God. I ask for the trial to pass me by and if the hardship remains, I call on the Holy Spirit for support. I could not have survived thus far without relying on God. Without the support of prayer, reading Scriptures, meditation through contemplative prayer, and the Eucharist.

We may never know the specific spiritual methods Jesus used and I believe that is good. We are all unique in our spiritual journeys and need to develop our own relationships with God. To that end, I pray you will consider your own Rule of Life; design the prayers and practices which are helpful to you in order to invite a deeper relationship with God. Find others deepening their spirituality to associate with so you do not get lost in challenges to your current thinking. I pray you will find a rich relationship and ever deepening relationship with your Creator, Redeemer, and Advocate!

# **Outreach News**

Goodwill recently picked up 45 bags of clothes and household goods from the Parish Hall. That means St. James will be giving away \$90.00 in Goodwill vouchers to people in need. Thanks to everyone who continues to support this ministry. We've noticed that the shelves are already beginning to fill up with bags from parishioners for the next truckload!

The Salvation Army will be sending a truck this week to swap out the full food barrel in the Parish Hall. This is another vital ministry that our St. James family has faithfully supported for a very long time. Thank-you to those who continue to add non-perishable goods to the barrels so the Salvation Army can continue to feed people each week.

Our Meals on Wheels program remains stable, with a core of individuals who make deliveries twice weekly (members of the St. Mary of the Pines parish make the other two weekly deliveries for this route). Huge thanks to those who regularly make this trek: Suzy Adcock, Mike Endicott, Bobbye Smith, Lorain Thrash, and Kathy Watkins. Thanks are also due to Betty McDonald who has expressed interest in becoming trained for deliveries and who is in the process of taking on this ministry.

Special 3-compartment containers for Filling in the Gaps are now available in the Parish Hall kitchen, ready for filling and freezing. Whenever we have a big communal dinner (Easter is coming soon) we can easily put meals in the freezer for use as needed. These containers with airtight lids are freezable, microwaveable, and dishwasher safe. If you notice that we are getting low, please notify the parish office so more can be ordered and we don't run out.

The Churches in the Southern Hills area have historically hosted Ecumenical lunches on Wednesdays in Lent. This year, due to a turnover in leadership at many of the churches, fewer churches are participating than in past years. #### IN MEMORIAM THE REVEREND SUSAN "SUE" WRIGHT BELL

St. James has had a number of priests come through our portals, but none were more beloved and appreciated than Sue Bell, the first woman priest at St. James. Sue died on February 15, 2017, after a courageous eleven-year battle with Alzheimer's disease. In 2002, our rector left just before Advent and the Christmas season, but difficult as this was, Sue Bell came to the rescue! Christmas with Sue's ministry was as glorious as ever. She was to remain with us until the arrival of the Reverend Newby in late 2003. Sue returned to St. James from 2005 until the latter part of 2006, serving as Assistant Priest and Coordinator of Christian Education during the tenure of Father Bryant.

Sue was born on February 23, 1932, in New Haven, CT, the daughter of the Rt. Rev. and Mrs. Godsell Wright. She graduated from the University of Texas, El Paso, and received her master's + 30 from LSU-Shreveport. A devoted teacher for thirty years, Sue retired from the Caddo Parish School System in 1999. She loved her students and teaching, which included English, fine arts, and Spanish. Her students knew her expectations were high, and she wanted them to do well.

At a very young age, Sue knew she wanted to become a priest, following in her father's footsteps, but priesthood for women was not acceptable at that time. So, after retiring from teaching (at the age of 67), she attended the Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest and was ordained to the priesthood in 2002. What a trendsetter she was as a seventy- year- old woman! Besides serving at St. James, she served at the CORE treatment center, Holy Cross Villas, and countless other charitable organizations. Sue was a wonderful priest: dedicated, conscientious and loving. I remember one time I asked her if she would take communion to one of our elderly and ill parishioners who had moved to the wilderness of Caddo Lake. "Of course," she said. I had directions of a sort (before GPS), but believe me, Ethel lived in the backwoods, down several dirt roads. Margaret Anderson went with us and thought we were lost, but Sue was brave of heart; "We'll find her", she assured Margaret, and we did. We had stopped on the way to eat lunch, but when we got to Ethel's she had prepared a full course meal. We just looked at each other and ate again without letting Ethel know. Sue had such wonderful manners! She loved the English language and wanted us all to use it correctly; she would even underline and circle misspellings and poor grammar in the newspaper. She also loved "plays on words" and puns, but most of all, she loved bringing Christ into the lives of people. She inspired us to be true Christians.

Sue is survived by three daughters: Nancy Bell McAllister, Margaret Bell Badgley, and Marian Wright Bell, six grandchildren, and a brother, Daniel Wright and his family. I knew the family before Sue came to St. James; I always thought the name "Bell" was so appropriate for the three since they were all "Belles": beautiful, talented and intelligent! Sue was always so proud of her daughters, but sometimes she would embarrass them. For example, she would sing hymns in the grocery store to drown out the "elevator music".

A wonderful memorial service was held for Sue at St. James with Bishop Jake as celebrant and a number of her fellow priests in the diocese participating (including our own Margaret) or being in the congregation. Father Carter delivered a thoughtful, delightful homily. The readings included a favorite passage from Revelation "the new Jerusalem" and the Prayer of St. Francis. Both our choir led by Kaye Crichlow and our praise team performed and sang the hymns that Sue loved including "O God our help in Ages Past" and "The Strife is O'er". The ECW of St. James prepared a delicious and bountiful reception following the service, and we all loved meeting and talking with Sue's family. Sue accomplished so much in her lifetime despite her long years of suffering at the end. "Neither death nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." Rest in peace, dear Sue.

# CLEANING OUT AND CLEANING UP

From talk around the parish and posts on Facebook, it appears several parishioners have decided that their Lenten discipline this year includes cleaning, sorting, organizing, purging, and in general, setting things to right. While we are doing this with physical clutter we feel a sense of freedom and a release of burdens. We experience the joy of renewal and a fresh start in our environment. If we peer closely, we may even discover that the feeling goes deeper. The physical act and the visible, even measurable, results can produce emotional and spiritual consequences, if we allow them to do so.

There are several ways to do this. The simplest is just to enjoy the endorphins created by our labors. We may also end up with a few pangs and twinges from reaching and toting in a manner that is not on our usual list of daily activities, but overall, the body is pretty good at rewarding us for moderate levels of work. Our minds frequently play along, providing a sense of well-being at a job accomplished or relief at a task no longer put-off, but tackled and defeated.

Another is to intentionally and with forethought put meaning into the work. Assign each task a corresponding emotional event. As you clean and organize, work out the angst of that event, so that by the time the project is completed, you have confronted and come to terms with the problem. Is there someone you wish to forgive, but just haven't been able to do so? Are you confused about your role in a situation or how to react to something that has happened? A mindless cleaning chore provides the perfect time to pray about your problem, seeking insight into yourself and your situation.

A third way to make scrubbing an emotional gain is to take all those things that you determined you no longer need and donate them to a deserving charity. Sharing our bounty with others is as helpful to us as it is to those we serve. Take home some Goodwill bags and bring them back to the Parish Hall with clothes you no longer wear, toys your children no longer want, and household goods that are cluttering up your space. Fill the Salvation Army Food barrels with non-perishable goods that you overbought and doubt you will get around to using. The new dog chow that your pet won't eat can be donated to an animal shelter, along with worn blankets, linens, and towels and any unused pet dishes, toys, leashes, and collars. Old prescription eyeglasses can go to the Lion's Club to help someone else see more clearly.

Lent is a spiritual journey. As we prepare for Easter, let's make the most of the journey. And while we are at it, let us always remember, The Episcopal Church welcomes us all.

#### **ANOTHER SEASON BEGINS**

The Community Garden Committee is readying the plots for planting. Before long we should be able to see young vegetables and herbs reaching for the sun and preparing to produce a bountiful harvest. Each spring the Garden Committee members do something new to enhance the garden. In the past they have installed an irrigation system that is buried so as to eliminate the hoses stretched across the lawn, added additional beds, and elevated beds to make them more accessible to people who are wheelchair-bound or who just have difficulty reaching the ground or getting back up. They plan to make the poles and trellises more solid this year, as high

winds snapped the supports for the pole beans and some of the tomatoes last year.

The Committee has doubled the garden's capacity. We now have six raised beds, each measuring approximately 32" X 23' on the inside and 4' X 24' around the perimeter. There is also a patch of blueberry bushes immediately to the north of the beds, which just may produce a few berries this year. By next year we may have enough to call it a harvest.

Dave Caporossi of the Garden Committee says, "There's always room for more people to come and play in the dirt. It is environmental therapy." He and the rest of the committee invite you to join them in planting, weeding, watering, and harvesting this year's crops.
