A MESSAGE FROM MORGAN

Dear Family of St. James,

It's almost Summer—time for school to let out, for vacations to begin and for me to have this baby!! :) I wanted to take this opportunity to talk to you all about my maternity leave and what you can expect while I am gone.

First, please know that you will be left in wonderful, caring hands. I have already received generous offers from priests far and wide to cover both Sunday and Wednesday services during my absence. Some of the faces you will see are The Rev. Andrew Comeaux, The Very Rev. Jaime Flowers, The Rev. Mary Richard, The Rev. David Greer, The Rev. Annie Etheredge and Lois Fraser! Jaime+ and Mary+ will be handling services on Wednesdays while Andrew+, David+, Annie+ and Lois will be taking care of Sundays. I ask that you show all of our guests the same warmth and hospitality you show me every Sunday. At least one of these volunteers is driving all of the way from Lafayette to be with us! See how special you are? :)



I am very excited that Lois Fraser has agreed to come to lead

us in Morning Prayer two Sundays in July. I know you all will be looking forward to the opportunity to re-connect with her and to hear her preach! On the Sundays where Morning Prayer is offered, there will also be music during the 11:00 a.m. service. The service schedule will not be changing for the summer with the exception of our St. James Day celebration on July 28th where there will be one service at 10 a.m. We'll remind you of this later on! I know that most of us are used to having Holy Eucharist available every Sunday. I want to take a minute to talk to you about why that is not possible for the entirety of my leave and in doing so, invite you to consider the blessings of our community. Most of you may know that our diocese is made up of mostly small to medium sized congregations.

There are a lot of churches in Western Louisiana who cannot afford full-time priests and/or do not have the means to have Communion offered every Sunday. For many of our brother and sister congregations, Morning Prayer on Sunday is the norm. Bishop Jake and his staff have been working diligently to come up with some long and short term solutions for these congregations and he has asked the full-time clergy of each convocation to consider whether or not a mid-week jaunt to another parish to offer Eucharist would be something we would consider adding to our calendars. It's important to remember that we are all the Body of Christ and as such, there are certain sacrifices that we must make from time to time for the good of the whole. I hope you will iovfully attend the Morning Praver services and that you would look upon them as an opportunity to stand in solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Christ who go without Communion on a weekly basis. Worship is still important, whether or not Eucharist is a part of our service. Worship is our heartfelt response to the love, mercy and grace of our Heavenly Father. Worship draws us nearer to God and to one another-it is an essential piece of life lived out in the Beloved Community. I hope you will take advantage of the opportunity to worship God in a different way while I am gone.

My last Sunday with you all, barring any major changes in my pregnancy, will be Sunday, June 23rd. I will miss you all terribly and will look forward to my return mid-August. If you have any questions about all that has been discussed in this article, please feel free to contact me!

Are you the type of person who likes to make decisions and who knows exactly how you want things to be? Do you like having the last word? Or maybe the type who likes to lighten the burden for others? Or are you the person who likes to have concrete plans for the future everything in writing and nothing left to chance? Do you know what all these personalities have in common? The ability to provide the parish office with preferences regarding your funeral arrangements.

We have a book in the parish office that contains the preferences of several parishioners. St. James members who wish to make it easier for loved ones by having their prayers, scripture passages, and music chosen in advance can leave that information where it is easy to find—right here at St. James. LET'S GO OUT WITH A BANG NOT A WIMPER!

During Adult forums in April the parish was given information regarding preparing for the end of life. We started with a presentation by Lois Maberry regarding things to consider when in hospice or the hospital, such as being an organ donor and whether you wish a "no resuscitation" order—and exactly what that means. Lois stressed the importance of discussing this with our families in advance of ever actually needing the information, in order to make it easier for everyone.

Morgan MacIntire dispersed packets that we can use to plan our funerals in advance (with thanks to the National Cathedral for sharing the template). If you have questions regarding this, contact Morgan or call the parish office. We keep a Planning Ahead book in the office safe which contains the preferences of any parishioner who wishes to save their families the task of deciding their funeral Morgan also discussed the specifics. cost differences between traditional burial in a cemetery, having ashes interred in a cemetery, being placed in a niche in the St. James columbarium, or having your ashes mixed into the memorial garden.

Curtis Shelton (esquire) ended the series with information about making our wills. He also volunteered to assist any parishioner in completing their will free of charge, with the caveat that they include a provision—of any size—for St. James. The Planning Ahead book has space for copies of wills, should anyone wish to leave one for the convenience of their families. Curtis recommended that we each make several copies, pass them out to family members, and tell them the location of the original.

May News from St. Luke's Episcopal Mobile Medical Ministry

Through a grant from the Susan G. Komen Foundation St. Luke's is now able to offer breast health education, clinical breast exams, and onward referrals for free mammograms for lowincome women in need. We began offering these services at our April Minden clinic. With the St. Luke's medical van set up in the Sav-A-Lot parking lot we saw thirty clients in three short hours. Nineteen of those clients were women and six were in need of a mammogram

and unable to pay for one. For those women we were able to provide referrals for a free mammogram in their community. We are excited to be able to offer this new service. YOU CAN ALWAYS CHANGE YOUR MIND

Something I am diligently teaching my child is that it is okay to change your mind. Whether we are talking about your stand on a political or social issue, your career choice, your field of study, or your favorite color, it doesn't matter. You are not forced to stand by the position you took several years ago—or even several minutes ago. When new information has been presented to you, taking the time to consider it and possibly redefine your conclusions on a related topic is a good thing.

I was speaking with a friend recently who told me she was amazed at how much her views have changed during her lifetime. She said friends and family had made note of it, mostly with the accolade that she has traveled far in the right direction. However, there is not always a right and wrong direction—sometimes there is just growth and maturity.

For example, if people head to college at age eighteen, absolutely certain of the path of study and the career ahead of them, then discover that they truly loathe the classes and the work, they shouldn't be so invested in sticking with the original plan that they spend their lives in states of unhappiness at jobs they hate. It is much more productive and fulfilling to step back, re-evaluate, and change course. Take the time to find the career that matches your interests, talents, and abilities.

While the final decision may be a good one for the individual, there may be other decisions that would have also been good. There could be several potential "right" choices. And for many, the right choice can sustain for a life-time. For others, it's good for a while, but needs to be updated periodically. Some find a vocation where they fit in and will always feel fulfilled. Others enjoy a career, but feel the need to make a change after a few years. There's nothing wrong with either situation. Each person should make the decisions that work best for them.

In our lives as Christians we face the same opportunities for growth. When we are children we live in a simple world where decisions are often made based on what our role models—parents, teachers, siblings, and other heroes—have taught us. As we grow older and more independent, we become aware that there are other methods, ideals, and directions that are different from what we consider the norm. As we reach the age when we can make our own decisions, many in the Episcopal Church seek confirmation, taking the opportunity to say we wish to take charge of our spiritual life and make informed decisions within the church. Some become church leaders, some increase their participation in church activities, and some take a more quiet, contemplative path. Some turn away from the Church, either to reach out to another faith, to rebel, or to take a break from any religious or spiritual life. All need to realize that they are welcome to return, because decisions made can be reconsidered. And let us always remember, the Episcopal Church welcomes all—whether people from another faith who have decided to join us, cradle Episcopalians who have always been with us, or those returning after some time away. We don't require that everyone think identically. We welcome the opportunity to hear views that are new to us, to learn, and to grow together. The Church is not stagnant because the people who comprise the body are not. We are learning, growing, and looking forward to maturing together.
