



Margaret's Musings

As a child, I recognized the flow of the Episcopal Church calendar. The birth of the Christ child gave way to the revelation of his identity, then we are suddenly caught up in his journey to the cross, only to progress through His death, resurrection, movement among friends and followers after his death, Ascension, and the giving of the Holy Spirit to the church. Now the year is half gone and the wide array of liturgical colors from Advent, Christmas, Epiphany, Lent, Holy Week, Easter, and Pentecost falls away to reveal the Green of "Ordinary Times."



There always seemed a vastness to "Ordinary Times" which appeared somewhat boring to this child's mind. Like an endless alfalfa field, the time between the Sunday after Pentecost up to

the Sunday before Advent seemed expansive. I would later come to realize this was the time of ministry. It was by design vast because the fields of evangelism and outreach are limitless.

Jesus' ministry laid out like a blueprint for my ministry; a time to share my relationship with God, to minister to those in need from a locus of love, to both teach and learn and to take time to pray and revitalize. It all seems pretty simple and it is. The problem is, I confused simple with easy.

Sharing my faith hit walls of resistance which I found frustrating. Who would not want to hear about God loving you so much he would send His son into the world to show you how to be close to Him and the Holy Spirit to help keep you on track? It was hard to understand people had experienced God differently and, in the worst case, felt He had abandoned them. Ministry came easily and felt natural, however, if I did not act out of love then my motives would harm my efforts.

This realization would be echoed in numerous conferences regarding Congregational Development, as church's actions could spoil the desired outcome due to the motivation. The example of growth to increase income was sighted as having disastrous outcomes when the motive was based on increasing the church's bottom line. Jesus' ministry was not about money; it was sharing a relationship with God. The congregations sharing relationships with God and building disciples are growing. They are open and welcoming communities built for the building up of disciples through education and ministry; they have a plan to integrate people into the life, ministries, and leadership of the congregation, and they teach ways to pray and to take time to revitalize the soul and body.

Simple but not easy. Studies show humans are not good at change. The Episcopal Church has found changing the Book of Common prayer, ordaining female clergy, or allowing additional music into our services to be deeply divisive positions. Change and sharing power are very difficult; look back at the history of the church. Unfortunately change is happening at a much more rapid pace and the Episcopal Church was designed to resist transitory change. General Convention has been grappling with a response to rapid change without being caught up in fads. Our local churches are being challenged by the same rapid changes and a need to change. Again, how do we adapt to address long term change as opposed to fads. There is a lot of work ahead, but through prayer and communication we will work through these times with the grace of God.



Outreach News

Thanks again to all who supported the donations of socks, lots of socks, and all the volunteers who made the Maundy Thursday foot washing such a great success.

Outreach is asking for volunteers to help feed the hungry. In March we were able to feed about 25 at Hope House. Without the help of Mike Endicott and Ron Maberry, I would not have been able to pull this off. Jan Jones, Bobbye Smith, Margaret Ayers, and I fed slightly fewer people in April. I would like to continue this on the fourth Thursday of each month. Please volunteer to help make this happen. It is much too big a job for one person to manage alone.

Recently a partnership with Common Ground was set up for them to receive all the fresh produce we pick up from Pizza Hut. Also, they would be grateful to accept the pizzas when school gets out for the summer. I am setting up a tour with them so St James can see where their food is going and the programs they offer.

A check was given to the King family to help with expenses as Jacob recovers from open-heart surgery, a check was written to St Luke's Medical van, and Outreach supported St Jude's with the purchase of a gift card as requested by Candi Gibson.

Please continue to fill the food barrels and fill the Goodwill bags. These two long-standing ministries supported by St. James have done a lot of good for many people in our community.

Again, please continue to support Outreach.

These meals are distributed to the recipients of the Meals on Wheels program (when the program is not available during holidays and inclement weather) and to hungry people who stop by the parish office during the week.



REACH OUT AND OFFER A HAND

In the ten years that I have been at St. James I have heard Debbie Fitzpatrick say on many occasions that the small number of members we've had in the EYC has not diminished their ability to make an impact. I believe her exact words are more closely: "They might be small in number, but they are mighty." We may not have an active EYC at the moment, but I believe that statement still describes St. James as a parish. Whether we pack the pews or not, we do have a large impact on the community around us.

Please be aware of how we are able to make a difference every day. We don't need great numbers of people to join subserve we go out to help others. We just need to go help others. If we wait for the pews to be full before reaching out to the community, new folk won't have a reason to want to come and fill our pews. By stepping out of our comfortable environment and reaching out to our neighbors we may accidentally discover people who would love to become a part of our St. James family.

If you did not grow up at St. James, think back to the reasons you were initially attracted to this parish. What was happening with the congregation at the time you decided to become a member? Were there outreach ministries that you found compelling? Was St. James engaged in community work that interested you? Did you see the work of Jesus taking place in the activities that surrounded the parish?

Have those ministries that first ignited your interest grown? Are they still in place? Are they still needed, or have sthey evolved into something else? Is there a similar need in the community that you would like to see addressed and have ideas regarding how St. James can make a positive difference?

We accepted money from the Diocese to enhance our kitchen so we could build on our outreach through the Filling in the Gaps program. So far we have done that through the Harvest Program in partnership with Pizza Hut. What other ways can we use our fabulous kitchen to help our community? Can we combine the produce from our garden with the tools in our kitchen to make food for people in need? If so, what is the best way to get the food to the people? Can we make soup or casseroles to deliver to Hope House? Can we serve free soups or casseroles to hungry people in our Parish Hall once a month (or once a week)? Can we teach low-income teens how to cook fresh veggies in a summer camp? Can we knock on the doors of our residential neighbors and ask them what we can do to help improve their lives?

I challenge my St. James family to help come up with ideas of how we as a parish can do an even better job of reaching out into our community and demonstrating that the Episcopal Church welcomes everyone.

ST. JAMES CONTINUES TO FEED THE COMMUNITY

Thanks to everyone for their concerns about the food in the kitchen. After consulting with Kathy Watkins and the very active Outreach Committee, St. James has entered into a ministry relationship with Common Ground. Perishables collected from Pizza Hut, such as mushrooms, lettuce, and tomatoes are used to feed under-served adults and children.

Also, another source of perishable food became available through Target, with Barry Taylor as our connection, and will be distributed through both St. James' ministries and Common Ground. We now have two sources of food items which would be otherwise thrown out (but are not spoiled). Teamed with the St. James' Garden Ministry and Filling in the Gaps Ministry, St. James continues to use the gift of hospitality in many amazing ways.



We will continue to deliver food to Green Oaks High School throughout the summer, as they have programming year-round. Times for delivery have changed, though. Instead of 2pm, we now need to have pizzas to the school by 10am on Thursday morning. We are actively seeking volunteers to help with this vital ministry.

Thanks to the Outreach Committee who works tirelessly and with little acknowledge-

ment to champion a wide range of ministries, they take God's love from St. James out into our community!
