

# A MESSAGE FROM THE SEARCH COMMITTEE

## **RECTOR SEARCH UPDATE**

During the first half of June the Search Committee at St. James received a number of portfolios from the Diocese of potential rector candidates. Due to the canonical requirements of how a search is conducted, the committee is not able to share the names or other identifying information about the individuals on the list with the parish. They are, however, currently following the guidelines set out for the next stage of the search process.

Of the identified potential rector candidates, we should anticipate that one or more may have already accepted calls to lead another parish. Of the remaining candidates, there will be some who may seem a very good fit. Those people will be pursued, and, as the Search Committee is able to share information, they plan to do so.

As of now, we must trust them to do what we have asked of them: seek a rector who will be the right spiritual leader for our parish. The Search Committee's ultimate recommendations to Vestry will not be based on any one factorcost, age, size of prior or current congregation, or their loy-

alty to the Saints or LSU. They will, however, do their best to ensure St. James moves forward with a rector who is believed to have the most potential to fill the needs of our parish and for dedication to helping us share Christ's message and love.

# THE GOOD STEWARDS

We look around the Parish Hall and see so many changes taking place regarding the kitchen upgrade. Thanks to Matt and to all the others who have supported the kitchen upgrade project.





### **Outreach News**

Thanks to the many parishioners who have already plucked tags from the Angel Tree in the narthex. The items listed on the yellow tags will be donated to Gingerbread House, a new focus of our Outreach Ministry. This local charitable organization is dedicated to helping heal children who have been abused. Following is a quote from their website, giving a description of their services:

The Gingerbread House Bossier/Caddo Children's Advocacy Center is a community-based, 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that began serving abused children in 1998. The Center works in close collaboration with local law enforcement, child protective services, the district attorney's offices, and medical and mental health professionals to provide the best possible services for abused children and their families.

The Gingerbread House coordinates interviews and investigations with the referring agencies and other professionals from the initial screening to the final disposition of the case. The Center assists in gathering evidence and documenting the victim's verbal testimony, which is necessary for criminal prosecution and related proceedings. Through the Center's advocacy program, child victims and their families are prepared for the criminal justice process in such a way that prevents further victimization. The Gingerbread House provides mental health interventions for child victims and their non-offending family members, so that the healing process can begin.

#### All services are provided at no cost to the victim's family or referring agency.

In addition to the services provided for child abuse victims, the Gingerbread House provides training opportunities for professionals working in the field of child abuse, as well as community education regarding child abuse and its prevention.




Matt has installed two cubbyhole shelving units. He still needs to take them down for painting, but they have met, or

## JUANITA JORDAN MAGEE A TRIBUTE TO OUR NITA **'LIFT HIGH THE CROSS'**

The woman who many considered the Matriarch of St. James Episcopal Church has died at the age of 95. Her long life was filled with devotion to God and the inspiration to bring others the peace and joy of knowing Jesus Christ and His love for all of us. Since she was confirmed at St. James in February of 1958, she has been a faithful, active and gifted parishioner of our church. She has given fiftyeight years of service to God, to His and our church and to her fellow men and women. We owe her an unpayable debt of gratitude, and I know she is finding

Nita was born on January 8, 1921, in Natchitoches, LA to Royce "Red" and Adelina Jordan and passed away on May 19, 2016. Nita was brought up mainly by her grandmother in a strict Catholic family. I believe she found the Episcopal church more open minded in terms of church doctrine and belief, and so she joined St. James in 1958. Nita was involved in nearly every aspect of church life, not only involved, she was a leader in whatever activity she undertook. At St. James she was the first member of the Daughters of the King; in fact, the first president when the group formed at St. James. She was a faithful Eucharistic Visitor and Lay Eucharistic Minister into her 90's as well as a member of the Altar Guild.

Nita's greatest gift, however, was teaching Sunday School to children of all ages as well as adults. Not only was she the most knowledgeable person I have ever known concerning the Bible, but she could also explain and interpret her lessons so well that all could understand. I remember a church member telling me once that someone had disagreed with Nita on a Biblical point. "Who would disagree with Nita?", she said. I laughed and replied: "Oh, well, we know Nita was right!" Nita was an avid reader and self-taught student of the Bible.

In ancient cultures we read of "the Wise Woman" who was a healer, a counselor, as well as a purveyor of knowledge and wisdom. Nita was our own Wise Woman. Many would go to her for counseling, for help with their life issues. So many have told me how much help Nita was to them in their time of need. Her advice was always couched in prayer, in Biblical terms. "What would Jesus do" became a popular slogan a few years ago, but believe me, Nita was far ahead of that slogan, always bringing Christ into the equation. We all felt that if Nita prayed with you and for you, you were assured of a direct line to Heaven!

When Nita's cat "Yellow Cat" was ill a few months ago, Nita was so worried about him. So worried that she asked Teresa Thrash and later, me, to pray for him. I had never prayed for an animal before, but I was willing to try. "His eye is on the sparrow," right? I am so glad to report that "Yellow Cat" is doing well and has a new home with an employee of Brook Dale.

Browsing among Nita's books that her family gave to St. James, I came across a beautiful book of poems by Helen Steiner Rice entitled Someone Cares. It was given to Nita in May of 1982 by the St. James Family, perhaps as an acknowledgement of her Sunday School teaching.

The inscription reads: "Nita, there are very few people in this life that have the gift that you possess. This is your ability to inspire with faith; your ability to express into words what all of us feel in our hearts. This is but a small token of our deep love and appreciation for all that you have done for the Parish." So beautiful, so true!



Nita was preceded in death by her parents, her husband A.L. Magee(Mac) whom I know many of you remember, as well as an infant daughter, Laura Ann. She is survived by two sons, Kenneth and David and their wives as well as her daughter Karen Tiemann and her husband, ten grandchildren and 23 great grandchildren. She loved and enjoyed every one of them. Nita loved all the people of St. James, but she loved Teresa Thrash as a family member. Teresa was an especially dear friend to Nita as were Betty Langhorst and Lynette van Heerden. She appreciated their kindnesses so very much.


I visited Nita about a week before she died. We were going out of town to our grandson's college graduation; I was telling her about it and added that I would come back by when we returned. She was rather despondent about the physical therapy she was undergoing so I said: "Let me say a prayer for you before I go," and I did. As I was kissing her cheek before leaving, she said to me: "Mattie, when you get to the Pearly Gates, I'll be there to welcome you." I know you will be, dear Nita! "Give rest, O Christ, to thy servant, Nita, with thy

# LOVE THY NEIGHBOR AS THYSELF

Let's stop the hate. While individually we don't have the power to affect much beyond our immediate surroundings and our own behavior, as a group we are mighty. We live our lives as Christians in a world that is not entirely Christian. We live in a world of many people, many religious beliefs, many cultures, many customs. Absolutely none of us—at least as adults—believe we live in a vacuum, where everything is rosy all the time or where everyone agrees with us.

As Christians we have been directed to, "love one another." The Gospel of John uses that exact phrase four times, quoting Jesus:

- I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. John 13:34
- 'This is my commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. John 15:12
- I am giving you these commands so that you may love one another. John 15:17

In three of the Gospels Jesus commands us to, "love your neighbor as yourself":

- Honor your father and mother; also, You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' Matthew 19:19
- And a second is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." Matthew 22:39
- The second is this, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." There is no other commandment greater than these.' Mark 12:31
- He answered, 'You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself.' Luke 10:27

Jesus didn't tell his disciples to only love one another. Nor were they instructed to only love other Christians. His directives are commandments, not just suggestions. The very heart of Christianity requires us to put effort into loving everyone. Jesus didn't just hang out with those who were exactly like him in culture, beliefs, class, or anything else. He spent time with the outcasts of society. He ate with the pariahs. He dared to break the Sabbath laws by healing during the prescribed time of rest. He requires the same of us.

We have been sent out into the world to spread God's healing love. We can't do that by arming ourselves literally and figuratively against those whom we don't understand. We can't do that by only discussing life with those who agree with us. We can't do that by refusing safe haven to those in need, declining to feed the hungry, allowing the naked to remain unclothed, or hiding behind our piety and refusing to get our hands dirty.

Love is not a clean, simple action. It is messy and difficult. It places our hearts in danger of being hurt—and sometimes our bodies, as well. And it is worth the risk. We each need to choose how we can best follow God's plan for us. We each have our own path, and if we are to stay on the path Jesus laid out, we will be setting out to accomplish a lot of loving. There are myriad people in our lives who can benefit from our love, many whom we may never actually meet. If we start by teaching our children to love others, despite their differences, we are on the right track. If we raise a new generation of Christians who see the power of reaching out a helping hand to those who are not exactly like us, based on the behavior we have modeled, we are following the path Jesus trod.
