

Whether it's a simple smile, or something more dramatic, any kind act you perform has the same positive effect – on both the recipient, and you. Below are some sample acts of kindness.

- Open the door for someone.
- Give a helping hand when you see someone carrying alot of stuff.
- Give a homeless person your leftovers from a restaurant you just ate from.
- Purchase a couple of umbrellas, blankets, ponchos at a dollar store and keep it in your trunk – when it's a rainy/cold day, find a person who needs it and give them
- Give a lottery ticket to a stranger.
- Leave anonymous thank you notes to teachers.
- Invite a friend to the movies or dinner.
- Put change in a vending machine.
- Leave a book you have already finished somewhere for someone else to read.
- Drop off a toy or game at a homeless shelter.
- Pay for a bridge toll for the person behind you.
- Send someone a small gift anonymously.
- Drop off flowers at your friend or neighbor's house.
- Buy a meal for a homeless person.
- Buy a movie ticket for the person behind you in line.
- Pay for someone's meal behind you at a fast-food drive-thru.
- Write an inspirational note to someone who needs inspiration.
- Send a card to someone in the military overseas.
- Put something you no longer need on craigslist.org for free.
- Drop off a toy or game at a hospital.
- At the post office, leave some extra stamps at the stamp machine.
- Buy a phone card and give to a homeless shelter for them to give to someone.
- Open the phone book, pick a name, and send them something (movie tickets, thank you card, book, etc.) anonymously.
- Take flowers to a hospital ward and give them to someone who hasn't had any
- Drop off teddy bear to police department to give to traumatized children.
- Drop a few coins in an area where children play, where they can easily find
- Write letters of appreciation to groups who are helping the community, the envi-
- Go to a tourist spot and offer couples/families to take their pictures with their camera.
- If you know someone who is having a hard time financially, pop \$5, \$10 or \$20 in an envelope, disguise your writing or type the envelope, and mail it to them.
- Tape some change to a payphone with a card saying it is for whoever needs it.
- Write anonymous, loving post-its for strangers to find.

The times, they are a'changin'. Desperate times call for desperate measures. Nobody ever said life is fair. And a whole lot more clichés are available if we want to look for them. Sometimes they are used to justify unfair and unequal treatment of others. Sometimes they are used in an attempt to console, as if knowing others have experienced similarly unjust situations would make a person feel better about their own dilemma.

I'd like to propose a change in attitude. Sure, I can believe nobody ever said life is fair. But that doesn't mean it shouldn't be fair. Knowing (or being reminded) that "that's the way it has always been," is not an excuse for continuing to do something we shouldn't. And the only way we can rectify any bad situation is to take an active role in making a change. So, let's put a positive spin on the adage that times are changing and work to improve those things that we believe need improvement.

When we notice something that isn't fair, whether it is in our government, our children's schools, our church, or anywhere else in our communities, we need to speak up and step up. When we sit back and watch, shake our heads, and mutter about a situation, we are part of the reason the situation may continue into the future. We may not have been part of the reason it developed in the first place. We may not have caused it. But once we are aware of a problem and we do nothing to solve it, we become part of it.

Now that is something that I really love about the Episcopal Church. We are among the forerunners in making positive changes in our communities. Take a look at some of the topics that have been discussed at General Convention. The Episcopal Church was at the forefront of making recommendations regarding conserving petroleum and reducing solid waste by using alternatives to bottled water. The Episcopal Church was among the first of the mainstream churches to ordain women. The Episcopal Church was among the first to ordain non-white clergy (to serve in white congregations) in this country.

The Episcopal Church is openly supportive of all individuals, teaching that all are equal in the sight of God and should be equal in the sight of humans, as well. The Episcopal Church is not afraid to take a stand for what is right, just, and fair, even if it happens to be controversial. We are please to say, "The Episcopal Church welcomes you."

#### TIME TO MAKE A CLEAN SWEEP OF EVERYTHING

The rummage sale committee is off to a good start with planning our **Truck or Trunk Sale** to be held October 5. Instead of the traditional church rummage sale where parishioners schlep their stuff to the church, dump it off, and leave it to be sorted, tagged, arranged, sold, and cleaned up, we're borrowing an idea from the All Saint's Universalist Unitarian Park-it Market.

We will be renting spaces in the large parking lot to anyone who wishes to set up a sales booth. This will be more of a flea market than garage sale. Vendors will pay \$25 to rent two parking spaces—one to park their car and one to set up a sales area. St. James collects the rental money for our operating budget. Vendors keep all their sales money.

We will also have a concession stand, which will be run by our youth as a fund raiser for the EYC. Donations of two quilts have already been accepted for raffle. If you have an item of value that you wish to contribute to the raffle, please contact Theresa Mormino.

We will need people to help direct parking, set up tables for those who wish to rent them (for \$5 each), and to donate baked goods or snack items for the concession stand. We ask that any food donation be packaged in individual portions. The EYC is accepting chips and drinks in addition to cookies, brownies, etc.

# THE GOOD STEWARDS






# CELEBRATE ST. JAMES DAY WITH US!

#### **Hint of Mint Fruit Salad**

- 1 cup sugar a boil. 1 cup water 1 cup loosely packed mint sprigs
- 2 ½ cups chopped apples
- 2 ½ cups chopped ripe pears
- 2 cups cubed fresh pineapple
- 2 cups sliced fresh strawberries
- 1 cup fresh blueberries
- 1 cup mayonnaise

In a large saucepan, bring sugar and water to a boil. Reduce heat; simmer, uncovered for 4 minutes. Remove from the heat. Add mint; cover and steep for 20 minutes. Strain and discard mint. Transfer syrup to a small bowl; refrigerate until chilled.

Just before serving, combine the fruit in a large bowl. Stir mayonnaise into mint syrup until blended; pour over fruit and toss to coat.

#### **Roasted Veggie Pasta**

- 4 small zucchini, halved and cut into 1-inch slices
- 2 large onions, cut into wedges
- 2 medium yellow summer squash, halved and cut into 1-inch slices
- 2 large sweet bell peppers, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 cup baby carrots
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 ½ cups uncooked fusilli pasta
- 2 cups (8 ounces) shredded fontina cheese
- 1 ½ cups heavy whipping cream
- ½ cup canned diced tomatoes in sauce
- ½ cup grated Parmesan cheese, divided
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- ½ teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper


In a large bowl, combine the first six ingredients. Transfer to two greased 15 x 10 x1 baking pans. Bake at 450 degrees for 25 minutes or until crisptender; set aside. Reduce heat to 350 degrees.

Cook the pasta according to the package directions drain. Add the fontina cheese, cream, tomatoes, ¼ cup Parmesan cheese, garlic, salt and pepper. Stir in the vegetable mixture.

Transfer to a greased 13 x 9 baking dish. (Dish will be full). Sprinkle with the remaining Parmesan cheese. Bake uncovered, for 25-30 minutes or until hot and bubbly. Makes 16 servings.

July News from St. Luke's Episcopal Mobile Medical Ministry

On the St. Luke's Medical Van we try to do more than just meet the health needs of the people we serve. We also want to show them that we care and that they are worthy and respected. We do this by taking time to listen and showing compassion.

This benefit of this was once again apparent this past Father's Day at our Hope House clinic. We had a dedicated group of volunteers come out that morning. Dianne, Susan, Monty and Lynn helped register clients while Kathryn, Nanci and BJ were in the van checking people's blood pressure, glucose and listening to what they needed help with. In addition, we had two physicians, Dr. Lafargue seeing clients with cardiac questions and Dr. Thompson seeing clients with diabetes and skin and respiratory infections. One of the clients we see regularly came in for his usual blood pressure check. He can be a little grumpy and rarely shows a smile. At first he was not interested in talking to the doctor about his hypertension but on second thought he decided it would not hurt. The doctor sat down with him and listened to his questions. This client spent a good 20 minutes getting answers to questions that he had probably never had the opportunity to ask before. And when he left the van he was grinning from ear to ear. It was the simple act of taking the time to listen and showing respect that made the difference in this man's life. Christ asks us to love others and volunteering at St. Luke's gives us that chance to bring Christ to others.

Volunteering is a great way to stay involved in our community and use the talents and skills that God has given us and to share them with others.
