








A MESSAGE FROM MARGARET

THE GOOD STEWARDS

In his article, "Looking for Hope," in the June/July 2017 issue of ALIVE! Bishop Jake wrote, "Hope does not disappoint so long as we feed the hungry and shelter the homeless. So long as we refuse to greet the stranger as an enemy. So long as we insist that our own welfare depends upon our neighbor's well-being. So long as we not only respect but guard the dignity of every human being." He ends the article by instructing us to do more than seek hope, but, "Be it."

Thanks are due to all the members of the St. James family who have been providing hope to others—whether by delivering meals on wheels, visiting people who are unable to leave their homes, supplying items that will make it easier for children to stay caught up and do their schoolwork in the upcoming academic year, providing fresh produce for the hungry, visiting those in prison, praying for individuals in need, offering comfort to the grieving, and all the many other ways that assistance is offered to God's children. We don't have to know the recipients to be a beacon of hope in our community. We only have to offer ourselves.

These are some of the ways that St. James makes use of the time and talents of our parishioners as we strive to be good stewards toward each other and our community.



WASTE NOT, WANT NOT—OR SO WE PLAN

There are several steps we take around St. James to act as good stewards of our resources. For example, when we replaced some of the heating and a/c units we installed programmable thermostats. When used properly, these save quite a bit of money, keeping the buildings at comfortable temperatures while in use without wasting resources during down time. But they only work as intended when they are used as intended.

The thermostats are programmed to save energy when the buildings are not in use and to adjust the temperature in the space an hour or so before we need it so there is time for the space to become comfortable when people arrive. If the space is used at a time that is not part of the normal schedule, it can be adjusted manually, and it will return to the programmed temperature a couple of hours later. However, if someone adjusts the setting and moves the thermostat to "hold" it will remain at that temperature until manually changed. This results in using lots of extra energy when not necessary (and raising the energy bill accordingly) and having the building not be comfortable at the times it is programmed for use.

Please, be aware of this when adjusting the temperature in the nave. We do not have programmable thermostats in the Parish Hall or the Garrett-Hall Building, so those must be adjusted manually. Please, reset the thermostat to 80 for the week during the summer (and 60 during the

winter) to help conserve energy in both those spaces. Also, don't leave the thermostats in the nave set in the "hold" mode.

Keeping our energy costs down leaves us with more money to spend on reaching out into the community to share our faith and to feed, clothe, shelter, and provide medical care for those in need.





THANKS FOR SUPPORTING OUR YOUTH

As the fall approaches and plans to rebuild the EYC come to fruition, we take this opportunity to thank everyone who has continued to show support for the youth of St. James. One way you may not even realize you are helping is by purchasing beverages from the drink cooler in the Parish Hall kitchen at 50 cents per can. So far this year \$68 has been collected from the cooler.

Thanks also go to those who have supplied drinks on behalf of the EYC. Folk have been sneaking into the Parish Hall periodically and filling the cooler shelves with a variety of beverages. We may not know who, but we certainly notice and appreciate the generosity.

BE AN ANSWER TO A PRAYER

"When you wish upon a star, makes no difference who you are, everything your heart desires will come to you..." When Jiminy Cricket sang that in Walt Disney's *Pinocchio*, he left out quite a few of the steps to attaining your heart's desire. The parts about hard work, perseverance, and overcoming adversity were kind of brushed aside. It seems that those are the same steps often left out when people pray to God and expect to be the recipients of a splendid miraculous resolution for all their woes.

In asking for a boon, whether for ourselves or for others, we need to be ready to participate in making the outcome be what we hope—and we need to be prepared for the possibility that maybe what we are asking is not exactly what we need. God sees a bigger picture than any of us can see, so maybe we need to make our requests more open-ended than we may initially intend—in addition to being willing to put forth effort toward success.

Much like Martin Luther's famous words, "Faith without works is dead," we could easily say that praying for something we are unwilling to work toward makes no sense. Luther felt that anyone who claimed to be Christian and did not go about their lives acting on behalf of others was not demonstrating the conviction necessary to be truly faithful. In the same way, sitting back and expecting God to work toward our stated goals without offering as much assistance toward their fulfillment as we are able makes no sense.

So, basically, if we pray for an end to homelessness, we need to get out and do something toward making that happen. If we pray that the hungry will be fed, we need to help provide food. If we pray for the forgiveness of our sins, we need to forgive others. In short, we need to take active roles in making the world around us be whatever we ask God for it to be.

At the same time, we can realize that what we are able to do in and of itself may not provide the solution. However, if many of us are pitching in, there can be a very large change toward the better. That is what our prayers should become—not instructing God to make the outcome fabulous, but asking God to guide us as we strive toward making the world better. Together we can be a positive answer to someone's need or prayer.

Let us come together to pray, to worship, to assist others...to offer ourselves as answers to the prayers of others as well as our own. As Christians we are able to accomplish much. As we strive to make our community better, let us always remember, the Episcopal Church welcomes us all, allowing us the opportunity for communal worship, communal prayer, and communal outreach.


