

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## A MESSAGE FROMTHE SENIORWARDEN

I'm bad at breakups. Back in my teens, when someone broke up with me, I would head to my room, crank up any album from The Cure, turn off all the lights and wallow in sadness. Later on, my mom would come in the room, open the curtains,



turn off the boom box and say, "You want to find someone to care about, no? Well, you're not going to find her in here. Get out of this room and go."

Similarly, I believe we as a congregation can grieve in this way, by putting up a wall to protect us from future hurt. But as my mom tried to explain to me, what we seek will not be found within the walls, but out in the community. I believe at this time, the best thing we can do is to get out and help others. Providing a service, helping them in their time of need, and being visible to others not only helps us grow spiritually, but also draws people in who want to be a part of that community. I encourage all of us to get out of our room, knock down that wall, and become active within and outside the church. Here are three opportunities to do such a thing:

We need volunteers to assist Debbie Fitzpatrick for the upcoming Vacation Bible School from July 24 – 26. As you know, we are combining with Central Christian Church next door, and we expect 20 kids each night. We will need a lot of help: getting supplies, providing food, keeping the kids from climbing the walls, you name it. If you can even volunteer just one night, please try and do so. Serving others will project to the community that we care and support the youth, and you will feel a sense of gratitude in helping others.

Another is the school supplies for Forest Hill Elementary. This year, we have an unusually high number of items that are still needed for the 30 backpacks that we present to the school. Approximately 70% of the students are considered low income, and these supplies are vital to their success in the classroom. Please consider picking up one or two items as you do your weekly shopping trip to Walmart or Target.

Finally, there is an opportunity to serve within the church. Due to attrition and people going off to school, we are seriously short on servers during the church service. We need help. I need help. I love to serve, but there is only so much that one person can do. The Acolyte, Lay Reader and Lay Eucharistic Minister are all important in assisting the priest in their duties, and when one or more are missing, the service doesn't shine as bright. You don't know what to do? We can teach you. You don't know if there is an alb that's your size, or can't figure out how to tie the cincture? That too can be taught. Will you be nervous? Of course you will, especially the first time. But the more you do it, the more comfortable you will get, and you'll see that your fears were unwarranted. Most importantly, you are serving your church and others to the glory of God.

As we serve others, and as we help the community, we serve God; so let's get out of this room and go..

Anyone who wishes to make monetary donations to Outreach to help fund the purchase of those supplies still needing to be picked up (after donations are









### **FAMILY MOVIE NIGHT**

### WASTE NOT, WANT NOT-OR SO WE PLAN

There are several steps we take around St. James to act as good stewards of our resources. For example, when we replaced some of the heating and a/c units we installed programmable thermostats. When used properly, these save quite a bit of money, keeping the buildings at comfortable temperatures while in use without wasting resources during down time. But they only work as intended when they are used as intended.

The thermostats are programmed to save energy when the buildings are not in use and to adjust the temperature in the space an hour or so before we need it so there is time for the space to become comfortable when people arrive. If the space is used at a time that is not part of the normal schedule, it can be adjusted manually, and it will return to the programmed temperature a couple of hours later. However, if someone adjusts the setting and moves the thermostat to "hold" it will remain at that temperature until manually changed. This results in using lots of extra energy when not necessary (and raising the energy bill accordingly) and having the building not be comfortable at the times it is programmed for use.

Please, be aware of this when adjusting the temperature in the nave. However, we do not have programmable thermostats in the Parish Hall or the Garrett-Hall Building, so those must be adjusted manually. Please, reset the thermostat to 80 for the week during the summer (and 60 during the winter) to help conserve energy in both those spaces. Also, don't leave the thermostats in the nave set in the "hold" mode.

Turning the thermostats up too high or turning off the system allows condensation to build up inside the

walls and mold to grow. In the past we have dealt with removing mold from walls in the Garrett-Hall building. Let's prevent that from happening, again, but following the recommendations of the heating and air conditioning experts who service our units.

Keeping our energy costs down leaves us with more money to spend on reaching out into the community to share our faith and to feed, clothe, shelter, and provide medical care for those in need.



#### PROGRAM UPDATE: Puerto Rico: Moving Forward After the Storm

Our global disaster assistance in 2017 was unprecedented – responding to earthquakes, floods, fires and the most damaging hurricane season in recent history.

Hurricanes Harvey, Irma and Maria left a trail of destruction across Florida, Texas, the Virgin Islands, and other parts of the Caribbean. In Puerto Rico, the U.S. territory had its share of challenges even before last September's one-two punch of hurricanes. The island was in an economic crisis with unemployment more than twice the average of the mainland United States.

In Puerto Rico, first Hurricane Irma struck, followed by the far more damaging Category 5 direct hit of Maria. It was the island's most destructive storm in over 80 years. Maria ripped apart homes and buildings and severely damaged over 75 percent of the island's agriculture. The cost to rebuild has been estimated at \$95 billion.

Episcopal Relief & Development's assistance to Puerto Rico began even before Maria hit, providing funding for the acquisition and storage of emergency food, water and essentials for survival. Diocesan leaders in San Juan have repeatedly expressed their belief that without this initial aid, people could have died. In the weeks after, technical support and funding continued, including the provision of a massive generator at the Diocese's distribution hub in San Juan. Supplies were delivered to parishes across the island, and local teams even forded streams and climbed through mudslides to reach people in isolated mountain communities. In Ponce, we continue to support volunteer medical brigades that leave Hospital Episcopal San Lucas to attend to those in need of medical help. In a single day, more than 1,500 people receive care.

As we turn to long-term recovery Episcopal Relief & Development is providing direct support to vulnerable households, emotional support for caregivers and assistance with volunteer management, vital networking and advocacy.

We know the future will bring hurricanes to Puerto Rico, so a key part of our work is in disaster preparedness. For Episcopal Relief & Development and the Diocese of Puerto Rico, long-term recovery means we're in it for the long haul – measured in years, not months – and evident in the resilience of the people.

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# Our Episcopal Church Welcomes (and Needs) You !

This particular space in our newsletter traditionally speaks to the inclusion of everyone in the Episcopal Church. But I want to look at this on a little more personal level: the inclusion of everyone in OUR PERSONAL Episcopal Church, St. James. We pride ourselves on being a family. It is the single most common answer to the question of what attracted us to St. James in the first place. But all families go through periods of change which strains relationships. We have lost a spiritual leader - again- and maybe feel somewhat abandoned. Morning Prayer is different from the Eucharist that we know by heart and can feel unnatural or confusing. Change is difficult and can be unsettling, but it can also be a means of experiencing new things and discovering new strengths and developing new ministries. We are a very active church, with outreach being a very important part of what we do. Right now, I believe that outreach should include reaching out and ministering to each other in our own family.

In Paul's letter to the Hebrews (Heb 10:23-25) we are admonished to "keep on encouraging each other to be thoughtful and to do helpful things. Some people have gotten out of the habit of meeting for worship, but we must not do that. We should keep on encouraging each other, especially since you know that the day of the Lord's coming is getting closer." How simple is that! Attending church! It doesn't require any particular skills or technology. Anyone can do it. The only requirement is enough love for our church family to sacrifice a little time on Sunday to help encourage each other. That means being in the Sanctuary every Sunday that it is possible for you to attend. Even when it rains. Or you would prefer to sleep. Or the service is Morning Prayer instead of a Eucharist Service.

Do you consider church a passive activity? Do you feel like you only go to church to say a few prayers (that you know by heart, so you don't have to think about it very much), listen to a sermon (that hopefully isn't too long so you'll get home in time to see the Saints game), and to get your blessing for the week (i.e. Communion)? Well, according to the Bible, there's a lot more to it! We are to be part of the Body of Christ, using our gifts to spread the word of God and living as an example of Christianity. That doesn't sound particularly easy to me. I'm going to need some encouragement and support. And that's where my church family comes in. When a "family member" isn't present at church, there are missed opportunities to minister to each other. We gain strength from each other to continue with our Christian lifestyle. Christianity is not an easy path, especially since it so often seems diametrically opposed to current societal norms. Therefore, I am encouraging you to participate in YOUR church. We ARE the church. BE that church. GO to church and encourage others. The Episcopal Church, OUR Episcopal Church, ST. JAMES Episcopal Church welcomes you and needs you!
