A delightfully delicious afternoon was spent on Sunday, November 2, when the ECW celebrated the official debut of our new cookbook. A TASTE OF ST. JAMES was hosted by our women so that parishioners and friends could enjoy a taste or two of some of the recipes included in ST. JAMES DAILY BREAD: SEC-OND VERSE.

The Parish Hall was bright and festive with 9 serving tables decorated with various themes that represented a variety of recipes from the cookbook. Those themes included Christmas, New Year's, Mardi Gras, and Valentine's Day as well as ethnic selections such as Italian, Mexican, Cajun, and even a "Tail-Gating" and breakfast table. Each table included an overflowing basket of goodies for the raffle that represented the theme and food of that group. Some of the delicious dishes (there were 30 or more) included bean and corn salsa, taco soup, jambalaya, black-eved peas, pralines, bread pudding, mandarin orange cake, crawfish chowder, lasagna, and so



many more! The event also included a raffle for the themed baskets and a silent auction for other items.

This cookbook, as you can tell from the title, SECOND VERSE, was the second edition of the ECW cookbook first published in 1985. Our ECW president, Tina Caporossi, had the wonderful idea of a new edition 29 years later. The cookbook is dedicated to all the women who have been parishioners of St. James since we began in 1955. Think of how many dishes have been prepared by our women in that length of time: church suppers, holiday luncheons, funeral receptions, as well as taking food and comfort to the bereaved, the shut-ins, and the elderly. Our women have also prepared dishes for money-raising activities to aid the poor and homeless in our society. You will even see some recipes from those who are no longer with us but still in our hearts.

The TASTE OF ST. JAMES, thanks to all who bought cookbooks, raffle tickets, and silent auction items, brought in over \$1000.00, so we should be able to renovate the Parish Hall restrooms quite handily. There are

WELCOME AND LEARN

I believe life is full of teaching moments—and for those who pay attention they are easily converted into learning moments. Yes, as adults it is our job to teach those younger than us so they can grow up to become productive members of society, grow in their Christian faith, and learn the skills they need to make good decisions later in life. But we also need to realize the fact we are adults doesn't mean we no longer need to learn. It may be easier to recognize a teaching moment and to apply it to our children's lives than it is to recognize learning moments for ourselves. Being able to take time to explain what is to be learned from a situation and to engage a child in actively seeking answers seems to be easier to do than to recognize that we, also, can learn something from situations as they arise.

Or maybe we grow complacent with our lives and don't want to make changes. This doesn't have to be a conscious decision—in fact, it frequently is not something of which we are even aware. It can be easy to get stuck in a rut without realizing we have fallen into one when our actions become routine.

Sometimes it is easier to react to a situation than to analyze and learn from the same scenario. For example, it is easier to become angry at an annoying driver than it is to empathize with why they may have made an error, recognize the traffic flow problems that led to the misjudgment, and make a plan for how to deal with it in a better manner if we should encounter it ourselves. When we are the ones who make mistakes we need to recognize what led to our errors, take responsibility for our part in the events, and analyze the situation enough to ensure we make better decisions in the future in order to avoid repeating our mistakes. That is <u>much</u> easier said than done.

AS LONG AS THE WEATHER HOLDS

Gardening in Louisiana has some major advantages over much of the country. While farther north many communities have experienced hard frosts, snowfall, and ice storms, we find ourselves shivering when the temperature dips below 60 degrees. We know winter is coming, but we also know we still have some time to enjoy our vegetables and flowers. And once the cold weather hits, we



know it won't be frigidly cold for an extended period of time, so we'll be able to get it in gear pretty early to start the next spring crops!

We are very fortunate that many of our tomato plants are still producing. We have okra still coming on, and the eggplant continues to fruit. Our fall crops are looking beautiful; several families have enjoyed the broccoli over the last couple of weeks and the cabbages are getting quite large. Our Community Garden Committee has certainly done a wonderful job providing fresh produce to the Southern Hills area.

If you've looked at the plot lately, you've noticed that the committee has been busy spreading the pine straw and leaves to keep the weeds at bay. This also decreases the amount of mud above-ground on rainy days—something we are thankful to have had in more reasonable amounts this year than in the previous two or three. It's not too late to drop off more leaves or pine straw—just bag them in thick, outdoor plastic bags so the plastic doesn't deteriorate too quickly in the sun, and leave them along the fence between the garden and the playground.
