

A MESSAGE FROMTHE SENIOR WARDEN

Over the past month, many of you have asked me and the other Vestry members what has been going on with the search for a new rector. As you all know, the first step was the congregational meeting on Septem-



ber 8th, but most don't know that the next step in that process took place on October 22nd. On that day, the St. James Vestry met again with Canon John Bedingfield in the Parish Hall. As he is in charge of transitions within the Diocese of Western Louisiana, all rector placements will be facilitated through him, with ultimate decision authority resting with the church family here. After reviewing our finances and discussing our preferences for best fits for the parish, Canon Bedingfield will make trips early in 2019 to the School of Theology in Sewanee, Tennessee, and the Seminary of the Southwest in Austin, Texas, gathering for us a list of candidates who will be graduating without an assignment to a specific diocese. From there, it will be up to us to follow the normal process to find the best candidate for this Parish.

Canon Bedingfield grilled us extensively to see if we would support the new rector; this rector would most likely be younger; with a lot of newer, unorthodox ideas that probably haven't been done here or anywhere before. If our attitude is to cross our arms, shake our heads and say, "We don't do that here!" then the rector will get discouraged, will stop trying, and all the potentially great things that they could do to grow the church will get stunted. And each of us on the Vestry emphatically expressed to Canon Bedingfield our desire to support the new rector in every way possible.

Speaking of the Vestry, you know our next Annual Meeting will be on January 27, 2019, and at that time we will be electing three new vestry members. This is a great opportunity to give back to the church that we all love. When asked, please give prayerful consideration to being a part of next year's Vestry.

Outreach News

This month Outreach has helped Common Ground, The Salvation Army, The Rescue Mission, and an individual family with Thanksgiving meals. We also received \$100 in vouchers from all the clothing collected for Goodwill. These vouchers were taken to Hope House to be given to individuals so they can shop at Goodwill and choose what they like. Additionally, we helped two individuals with bills. Please continue to bring clothing for our warm clothes collection, the Gift of Warmth. We are still doing pizza, which is so appreciated by the people at Common Ground and Green Oaks High School.

Outreach feeds lunch every fourth Friday at Hope House;, we are averaging about fifty people. We also call Bingo on the second and fourth Fridays. If anyone has bingo prizes they would like to give that would be great. NOW remember they are homeless, so things like flash lights, batteries, duct tape, lighters, matches, \$5-\$10 fast food gift cards, lip balm, and hand warmers make perfect prizes.

STEWARDSHIP DRIVE UPDATE

As of this printing St. James has received twenty-three commitment cards pledging \$106,820.00 toward the general fund in 2019. Money in the general fund goes toward Outreach, ministries, salaries, and everyday expenses such as utilities and supplies. Some parishioners choose to pledge a little extra each month, designating those additional funds be placed in the Building Fund which is used only for building projects, maintenance, and upkeep of the buildings and grounds.

Last year we received 34 pledge cards totaling \$129,090.00.

Following is an excerpt from the October Vestry minutes: "Tommy Mosley announced that the budget/finance committee will meet the first week of November to finalize the 2019 budget. Most of the numbers are already in place. If anyone or any group wants to talk about their budget or has a special monetary request, please feel free to contact Tommy, Pat Parker or Julie Eason before the meeting. As of today, income for 2019 looks to be around \$140,000 with expenses running approximately \$131,000. Everyone is encouraged to please turn in their pledge cards, if they haven't already done so."

WHAT IS THE RENZI CENTER?

The Renzi Education and Art Center is an independent, 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. The Sisters of Our Lady of Sorrows founded the Renzi Center in 1997 for the children living in Shreveport's Highland and Stoner Hill neighborhoods, so they would have a safe, nurturing, educational, and fun place to go to after school.

Since its founding, the Renzi Center has been an oasis for children growing up in poor, crime-ridden areas in Caddo and Bossier Parishes. Our free After School Program and free three-week Summer Camp have given at-risk K-12 youth opportunities they wouldn't have

had otherwise. They receive one-on-one assistance with their homework and learn supplementary knowledge and skills from professional teachers, which boosts their academic performance. They explore, discover, and express their creativity under the guidance of professional artists. Caring staff, teachers, artists, and volunteers are positive role models for our students, which helps counter the negative influences of the streets.

We see the results in very short time: kids who are more self-confident and happier. They do better in school. Their grades go up, their behavior improves. Their families and communities do better, too. They can have peace of mind knowing their children are safe after school; they can be more productive at work; they save money by not having to pay for a babysitter or daycare; their children behave better at home; and they get to see and feel proud of their children's accomplishments -both in school and at the Renzi Center. They see their children become civic-minded citizens, willing to give back to their families and communities.



The children's pageant will take place during the 11am service on December 9, in lieu of the sermon. Please come and support our children and youth as they teach us about the Christmas season.




THE FULLER CENTER CHRISTMAS STORE

Appreciation. How good are we at showing others how much we appreciate their efforts? Do we see words to indicate appreciation? Do we use actions? Gestures? Some people take advantage of the holidays to make the rounds of family and friends, visiting, sharing laughter and updating each other on their lives, and letting them know how much they are loved, missed, and appreciated.

Somehow, it seems easier to do these things with people we don't see frequently. It is much easier to take for granted those we interact with daily or weekly. We expect them to do all that they have always done and sometimes only truly appreciate their efforts when they are no longer there to provide. Let us all take the time to notice those little things that others do that add up to making our lives better.

Does your spouse show up at home with groceries so you don't have to go shopping, or phone and ask if you need something picked up? Does your child remember to do daily tasks without reminders—at least some of the time? Do your co-workers greet you with a smile, a hello, a sincere inquiry regarding how you are doing? Does you neighbor let you know if something unusual is happening on your block? Does your best friend call for no particular reason other than conversation with you? These are all things that indicate the other people in your life care about you. Take the time to let them know that you notice and appreciate their efforts, and recognize that they may be equally emotionally dependent on such little things from you.

Jesus instructed us to care for one another—to build each other up, encourage each other, recognize the importance of community. A large part of that is the effort he expects from us in making certain all people know they are welcome in our midst. Let us spread the news by our words, actions, and gestures: The Episcopal Church welcomes everyone.


NOMINATIONS FOR VESTRY DUE BEFORE JANUARY 9

Please begin considering who you believe would be an asset to the St. James Vestry and who you would like to represent the parish at the 2019 Diocesan Convention. Vestry nominations are due by January 9, a bit more than two weeks before the Annual Meeting. This allows time for the names to be mailed to parishioners prior to the meeting, in accordance with state laws governing corporations. The names will be included in the January issue of the *Spirit of St. James*. Nominations for delegates may be made in advance or may be made from the floor during the meeting.

According to our Parish By-laws, qualifications to serve on the Vestry are:

- Be a communicant in good-standing
- Be a member of St. James for at least 6 months
- Be at least 16 years old
- Be a contributing member of record
- Be a regular attendee of worship and other parish events
- Be available to attend Vestry meetings and perform vestry duties
- Be committed to the spiritual growth of St. James.

And remember, the Diocesan Convention will be held in the spring, beginning in 2019.
