



### MARY THOMAS MARTIN ONE OF ST. JAMES' FOUNDERS

A memorial service was held for Mary Ethel Rosalee Thomas Martin, one of the original founders of St. James, on October 11, 2019 at St. George's Episcopal Church. Mary was 92. In 1955 she and her husband Bennet A. Thomas were among the 9 families that met for the first time to establish a church in the Sunset Acres area. Three laymen from St. Paul's had a vision to establish a mission in southwest Shreveport. They included Dr. Richard Spears, Robert Booth and Truman Thomas. The meeting was held in a vacant storeroom facing Hearne Avenue in Sunset Village Shopping Center. Mary officially became a communicant of St. James in January of 1956.

Mary was born in Shreveport on February 16, 1927 to Cary and Aline Rosalee. She was preceded in death by her parents and husband Thomas Martin. She is survived by her daughter Sharon Thomas Patton, son Bennett Arthur

Thomas, 5 grandchildren, 10 great grand children and 6 great grandchildren. Mary had attended St. Matthias before coming to St. James and was a parishioner of St. George's at present. I met her a few times in the past when she would visit St. James. Her former brother in law, Robert Thomas, also was a parishioner of St. James until his death.

Thank you, Mary, for being one of our founders. St. James was blessed to have people like you to care so much about spreading God's Word. Rest in Peace, dear Sister in Christ.

#### DR. JOHN MCNEIL RUST

Dr. John McNeil Rust, local veterinarian and former parishioner of St. James, died peacefully at the age of 92 on November 14, 2019. Dr. Rust and his family: wife Dot, children Carol Rust McClure, sons Vernon, Kenneth and Mark all were confirmed at St. James in the1970's. He and Dot were faithful church goers. The children were in their preteens and teens and were very active in the St. JamesYouth Group. Dot and Mark have passed away.

The Rust family went on to become members of Christ United Methodist Church. He was the founder of the Summer Grove Animal Hospital which expanded to Towne South Animal Hospital. He was a consultant to both LSU and the VA hospitals and was voted as Veterinarian of the Year in 2004.

Dr. Rust was a personable, intelligent man, and an excellent veterinarian. I remember him saving the life of our Cairn Terrier, Charlie, who developed a serious ailment and had to spend several weeks with Dr. Rust at the clinic. He and his

staff saved Charlie's life and I will be forever thankful! John loved horses and had wagons and surreys, driving them until he was in his eighties. He continued to ride after he sold his wagons.

Since he had served in the U.S. Army during the Korean War, he was buried at the Louisiana Veterans Cemetery in Keithville. Rest in Peace dear friend and brother in Christ.

Memories were made getting together for family dinners, cheering on grandchildren in ball games and swim meets, and sharing his never ending wisdom with his children and grandchildren.

Dad was larger than life, and we will miss him tremendously. Dad left us with the knowledge and assurance that we will see him in Heaven one day. What a tremendous legacy and gift to leave your family! Thank you Dad!

#### Some of the Saints Commemorated in December



Nicholas Ferrar December 1

Nicholas Ferrar (1592–1637) was the founder of a religious community at Little Gidding, Huntingdonshire, England, which existed from 1626 to 1646. His family had been prominent in the affairs of the Virginia Company, but when that company was dissolved, he took deacon's orders, and retired to the country.

At Little Gidding, his immediate family and a few friends and servants gave themselves wholly to religious observance. They restored the derelict church near the manor house, became responsible for services there, taught many of the local children, and looked after the health and well-being of the people of the neighborhood. A regular round of prayer according to the Book of Common Prayer was observed, along with the daily recital of the whole of the Psalter. The members of the community became widely known for fasting, private prayer and meditation, and for writing stories and books illustrating themes of Christian faith and morality. The community became an important symbol for many Anglicans when religious orders began to revive. Its life inspired T.S. Eliot, and he gave the title, "Little Gidding," to the last of his Four Quartets, one of the great religious poems of the twentieth century.

## Nicholas, Bishop of Myra December 6

Nicholas was born during the third century in the village of Patara in Asia Minor. At the time the area was Greek and is now on the southern coast of Turkey. His wealthy parents, who raised him to be a devout Christian, died in an epidemic while Nicholas was still young. Obeying Jesus' words to "sell what you own and give the money to the poor," Nicholas used his whole inheritance to assist the needy, the sick, and the suffering. He dedicated his life to serving God and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. Bishop Nicholas became known throughout the land for his generosity to those in need, his love for children, and his concern for sailors and ships.



Under the Roman Emperor Diocletian, who ruthlessly persecuted Christians, Bishop Nicholas suffered for his faith, was exiled and imprisoned. After his release, Nicholas attended the Council of Nicaea in AD 325. He died December 6, AD 343 in Myra and was buried in his cathedral church, where a unique relic, called manna, formed in his grave. This liquid substance, said to have healing powers, fostered the growth of devotion to Nicholas. Through the centuries many stories and legends have been told of St. Nicholas' life and deeds. These accounts help us understand his extraordinary character and why he is so beloved and revered as protector and helper of those in need.

#### Vestry Nomination Process

While it may seem early, it is important that the entire parish begin now to get ready for the Vestry election which will be held at the Annual Meeting in January. It takes a while for us to receive the names of the people you think would serve well, and then to publicize those names long enough for the parish to make an informed decision.

First of all, to be qualified to serve on the Vestry one must be a Confirmed Episcopalian and a member of the parish. The other qualification is that one must support the parish and the Episcopal Church with a financial pledge. The Vestry's main mission is to tend to the business aspects of running the church, while assisting our Priest as he tends to the spiritual needs of the parishioners. However, Fr. James has no involvement with this process; his job is to allow the parish to go through the election process and then to serve with whomever we elect. As for time commitments, the Vestry has at least one meeting a month where we discuss any pertinent issues coming up, and each Vestry member, on a rotating schedule, is responsible for opening and closing up the church. The Vestry is the governing body of the parish and all that is accomplished here is the result of a partner-ship between the Vestry, the Priest-in-Charge, and the associated Staff (administrative assistant, music director, etc). Your participation in the election process helps continue this healthy partnership.

This year, Krystal Eason, Lauren Ocmand, and Dave Caporossi will be completing their term on the Vestry, and I do thank them for their hard work over the last three years. And now that we have a Priest to lead the church, I am also rotating off the Vestry. Church bylaws state that we can have up to 9 members on the Vestry, which means that we can have up to 5 people join the Vestry come January, since we currently have 8 members on the Vestry.

If you are approached by Vestry member or parishioner about the Vestry, please do give it some consideration. There are always things in life that we think would make serving on the Vestry difficult. You might think you are too busy, too young, too old, too inexperienced, too tired of serving. But if someone comes to you, it is because they have thought long and hard and feel you have a positive influence in the church. Saying no to them blocks the effectiveness of the process and hurts the parish.

The Vestry hopes to have a slate of people that are of varying ages. We need people who are young and have a fresh perspective. We need people who have some wisdom of experience. We need people who have been in the parish only a few years who might see some things the rest of us cannot see. We need people who have been in the parish longer who see some things that can only be seen with experience. We need a balance of male and female. We need business minds, creative minds, people who think theologically, people who think practically, people who are risk takers, and people who are careful. In short, we need YOU! The more names that are presented, the better. The more people who seriously consider themselves as potential Vestry members, the better. And the more the nominees can see the great service to the parish they are providing just by having their names on the ballot, the better.

As Christians we are called to serve humbly and faithfully. You serve the parish well by providing names and by allowing yourself to be on the ballot when invited. You may contact any member of the Vestry to submit names for consideration, or to get additional information about the Vestry.
