



A MESSAGE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

I am writing this on the third Sunday of Advent. Paula Claire+ mentioned in her homily this morning that today is Gaudete Sunday, which comes from the Latin word for "rejoice" in opening of the antiphon "Rejoice in the Lord always." Today is also sometimes called "rose Sunday," and we did in fact light the rose colored candle in the Advent wreath this morning. This reminded me of a conversation that I had with a friend and co-worker early last February. That co-worker is a man of strong Christian faith but is of a different mainstream faithtradition. He was looking at a calendar, noted



that Mardi Gras was earlier than it had been in 2014, and asked - perhaps rhetorically - how "they" know when to hold Mardi Gras. Well, being a longtime Episcopalian, well-trained in the liturgical calendar by virtue of a confirmation class some years ago, I could not pass up the opportunity to tell him about how "Fat Tuesday," Mardi Gras Day, is the end of carnival season and is also the last day before Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent. My inquisitive friend said he had heard of Ash Wednesday (and maybe Lent) and wanted to know more. I went on to tell how Ash Wednesday is a movable holiday based on the 40 days of Lent - not counting Sunday feast days - leading up to Easter. Ah, yes, he knew about Easter being a variable holiday. I then went through the church year and how it is reflected in popular culture, especially here in Louisiana: Advent—the preparation for Christ's birth and the Church's new year, Christmas (12 days worth, like in the song), Epiphany, twelfth night, carnival season, "Fat" (Shrove) Tuesday, Ash Wednesday, Lent—preparing for Easter, the various days of Holy Week, Ascension, Pentecost, and finally I threw in several feast days of popular saints just to round out the year. My very Protestant colleague was fascinated. Perhaps tomorrow I will tell him about Gaudete Sunday; rejoicing over the coming of our Savior should never be limited to any one denomination.

Well, while we are thinking of seasons, there are some seasons of a more administrative nature coming up shortly after Christmas and the secular New Year's Day. The St. James Annual Meeting will be held on January 24, 2016. At that meeting, our parish will look back over the last year and into the upcoming year. We will also elect delegates to the Diocesan Convention and elect three new Vestry members to fill the three-year positions of those

THE GOOD STEWARDS


With the holidays upon us it seems there are even more things to do around St. James than usual. And as a result, there are even more people jumping in to assist.
