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Margaret's Musings

I don't know about you but I find it too early to put out Christmas items and start Christmas music in October. I cherish celebrating each holiday, but because Christmas is a cash cow for retail establishments it is getting more and more time in front of us on retail shelves. I understand the need to make a profit, but what happened to the meanings behind Thanksgiving and Christmas?

Thanksgiving harkens back to the days dominated by agriculture and the blessing of a good harvest. We recall the story of Ruth and the farmers leaving grain around the edge of their fields for the poor to harvest and eat. Without that food, Ruth and Naomi might have died and the lineage from David to Jesus might have been broken. The way we treat those who are hungry and/or poor reminds us of others' contributions to the coming of Jesus.



Being liturgical and someone who grew up in the north where we have four seasons in a year, I like seasons! Advent, the preparation for the birth of Christ, the Messiah has become a season of shopping and parties. How do we use this time to prepare ourselves for the coming of Jesus and not a day of presents for ourselves?

First, I would suggest slowing down and living in the now. Crazy!?!? Yes, in a month of planning ahead (presents, food for parties and Christmas Eve through Day, and various social obligations) we are hard-pressed to live in the moment. A Spiritual discipline, living in the moment is touted in advertisements with parents missing contact with their child during dinner because they are on their cell phones or Harry Chapin's song "Cat's Cradle" co-written with his wife Sandy. The song is about a man who is so busy he misses moments with his son until his son is so busy with his life there is no time for a relationship. While these are extremes, we tend to be so focused on the future we skip over the present. A woman cannot in a healthy way hurry up a pregnancy; she must wait for the child to grow within her; a person with a serious health concern must slow down and wait out the treatment.

Second, see how you can serve others; something St. James is good at. Sometimes your problems may be overwhelming, yet often seeing others' situation may give a needed perspective. When we hone in on how something hurt us we can develop a empathy towards others. Jesus seemed to have an empathy toward those who came to him broken by life, hardships and illness, still seeking help and hope.

Finally, find ways in your home or church to remember the coming birth of Jesus. Remember the traditions which caused the yearning desire for the Christ child through the Old Testament. Remember, we also have the call of God to take care of the widows, orphans and foreigners among us. Remember and teach our Baptismal Covenant to ourselves and our children in words and action.

May the Peace, Hope, and Love Jesus brought into the world surround and comfort you this season of light shining through the darkness. Blessings.

DEDICATION OF ST. JAMES KITCHEN TO NITA MAGEE

Reaching Out GIFT STARTS WITH LOVE

Woman in need receives complete home comfort system, thanks God

Gail Dzvornick had been praying for a miracle, and it came in the form of a guy named Love.

Chris Love, a service technician with Shreveport Service Experts Heating and Air Conditioning, arrived at Dzvornick's house last winter on a routine service call because her heater was not working, he said.

What he discovered was a 28-year-old unit barely hanging on. "The unit was in really bad shape," he said. When he checked on her air conditioning several months later, the situation had deteriorated. He discovered that not only were the motor and electrical components bad, the capacitors were almost completely out.

"I told her that basically the unit was pretty well done and that I couldn't tell her how much longer it would keep running before it caused her issues and problems," said Love, "She started crying and told me she couldn't afford to even put a part on it much less anything else. She was on a very fixed income."

"I can take the hot summer, but in the winter, my body gets stiff, and I can't function if I don't have heat," said the 74-year-old. Dzvornick, who is wheelchair-bound, was born with cerebral palsy and has undergone 22 different orthopedic surgeries in her lifetime, she said.

Though he didn't tell her then, Love said he went back to the office and began trying to discover what could be done for her.

"We could have repaired it, but it would have been throwing good money after bad," said Love's general manager, Lee Savage. So, the whole office decided to pitch in to see how they could help.

"We all got involved with trying to get the company we do most of our business with, which is Lennox, to donate a system to her," said Savage. "We were successful, and all the guys were on board to help out."

"They called me one day and told me they just couldn't leave me like this, and they decided I needed a new unit, and they were going to give it to me at no charge," said Dzvornick.

Dzvornick received a complete home comfort system from Lennox, valued at nearly \$8,500, which technicians with Shreveport Service Experts installed free of charge on a recent Saturday.

"Honestly, I was willing to pay them to do it one Saturday, but they all said nope," said Savage. "They wanted to donate their time. It makes you happy as an employer to have people who are willing to do that."

"She was just absolutely beside herself," said Savage. "I just can't explain to you the level of excitement and appreciation she had. She had basically said that she had been praying for help and said, 'There is a God, and He answered my prayers.""

"She started crying and told me that she felt like she won the lottery," said Love. "She said these types of things don't happen to people."

"I feel like God really has blessed me," said Dzvornick. "I'm really thankful for everything they've done. I won't forget it."

Shreveport Service Experts has been serving the community since 1952 with six NATE-certified technicians. The center also collects care packages for the homeless and maintains the Do Good Project, a Facebook page that raises money and repairs homes in the area for those in need. This year alone, the Do Good Project has collected and distributed more than 500 care packages and completed three service projects repairing, painting and upgrading homes for those who can't afford to.

The page, founded by Savage, recently formed as an official 501(c)3 to facilitate an annual campaign to raise money to pay the bills of local cancer patients.

INFORMATION PLEASE!

At one time, long, long ago before we relied on Google for information, an almanac was published yearly with the title INFORMATION PLEASE! named after a quiz show of the same name. As the self-proclaimed historian of St. James, I feel motivated to clear up a couple of points that seem in dispute among our parishioners, so here goes:

THE GARRETT-HALL BUILDING

The Reverend Wallace Garrett served as our vicar from 1962 until 1971 when he met an untimely death. He was responsible for the planning and construction of St. James Episcopal Church on 7 acres on Flournoy-Lucas Rd. (now Bert Kouns). It was a multi-purpose building to be used for worship services and for church school classes. The plantation type brick building was bordered with a covered portico with offices for rector and secretary, kitchen, nursery, equipment room and a large open area convertible from sanctuary or fellowship hall to individual classrooms through collapsible partitions. I remember the arrangement well! The St. James Mission moved into the new building (our current Parish Hall) in March 0f 1968. Father Garrett was also responsible for the first cross erected in early 1969. "Let there always be a cross," reads a marker at the bottom of the cross.

The Reverend S. Keith Hall was called to be vicar at St. James effective in September of 1971. Before this, Father Hall, who was serving as Assistant Rector at St. Paul's, came to St. James and took over the confirmation class begun by Father Garrett and presented the class to the Bishop the following May. Needless to say, the people of St. James were in pain and confusion, but Father Hall took charge and gave the congregation emotional and spiritual sustenance which was sorely needed. During his tenure a new sign was erected on Flournoy-Lucas and a new organ was secured from the old St. Vincent's chapel. The so-called Girl Scout Hut was completed in 1975 and was used by 9 to 11 troops weekly, another Christian family on Sundays and Wednesday evenings, dance groups, church school classes, and the EYC. Church dinners were often held there. In March of 1976, St. James Mission became a Parish Church and Father Hall became the first Rector of the fifth Episcopal Parish in Shreveport. In 1977 Father Hall headed the committee for a building fund for a new church building. He left St. James in 1980, serving several more churches including St. Matthew's church in Bogalusa. He died in 2003.

Years later, the so-called Scout Hut was refurbished (really an on-going project) and given the name The Garrett-Hall Building after the two men who did so much for St. James. I know the name is confusing if the you leave off the word building, but it should be left as it is. Through the years many celebrations, dinners, rummage sales, special events such as Stewardship dinners, Rally Day events (What happened to Rally Day?), and even this past year the vestry gave approval for our new rector to live there while she was looking for a house in Shreveport. It seems a shame that we do not utilize the Garrett-Hall Building more, considering the work and expense that has been put into it.

THE MEMORIAL GARDEN

The Memorial Garden in the St. James courtyard was built by the family of a young woman, Dena Crick Aldridge, killed in an automobile accident. The garden was planted with flowers and two statues were put in place. Years later, two young boys broke the statues and the church bought another St. Francis statue, smaller than the original, if I remember correctly. Dena is not buried in the garden, neither are her ashes. In January of 2002, a former parishioner of St. James, Waldo Emerson Cragar, died, and his wife brought his ashes back to St. James to be placed in the memorial garden. Em's are the only ashes in the garden. There was a small stone with Em's name on it at one time. An angel commemorating the life of long-time parishioner and church administrator Margaret Anderson was placed beside the garden in March of 2017. I do not feel this garden should be done away with since Em's ashes are there, perhaps it can be enlarged.

I have put all this information in the newsletter before, but apparently it needs repeating, even going back to the history I wrote in 2005.

NOMINATIONS FOR VESTRY DUE BEFORE JANUARY 14

Please begin considering who you believe would be an asset to the St. James Vestry and who you would like to represent the parish at the 2018 Diocesan Convention. Vestry nominations are due by January 14, two weeks before the Annual Meeting. This allows time for the names to be mailed to parishioners prior to the meeting, in accordance with state laws governing corporations. The names will be included in the January issue of the *Spirit of St. James*. Nominations for delegates may be made in advance or may be made from the floor during the meeting.

According to our Parish By-laws, qualifications to serve on the Vestry are:

- Be a communicant in good-standing
- Be a member of St. James for at least 6 months
- Be at least 16 years old
- Be a contributing member of record
- Be a regular attendee of worship and other parish events
- Be available to attend Vestry meetings and perform Vestry duties
- Be committed to the spiritual growth of St. James

Yes, nominations can be made through the Parish Office until January 14th, which is two weeks before the Annual Meeting. However, any nominations received after January 5th may not make it into materials mailed to parishioners prior to the meeting.

Names submitted between January 5th and January 14th will still be eligible for the positions of Vestry members and convention delegates and will be included in the ballots at the Annual Meeting. Bios just may not be available in advance mailings.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE VESTRY

The Vestry of the congregation is responsible to provide a safe working environment for the Rector as well as for the congregation. To that end, Vestry members should participate in safe boundary education for both children and adults, provide for the temporal care and spiritual renewal of the Rector, and support the ministry of the Rector.

Vestry members attend an annual retreat which includes a mutual ministry review of the Vestry and Rector and development of goals for the congregation over the following year. While the Vestry is responsible for setting policies for the operation of the congregation (that are in keeping with the Canons of the Episcopal Church, the Diocese of Western Louisiana, and the laws of the State of Louisiana), the Rector's duties include enacting these policies. The Rector also has sole oversight of all employees of the parish. In short, the Vestry shall minister in union with the Rector.

The Vestry is responsible for seeking ways in which the congregation may minister to the needs of the City and Parish in which it is set, and shall participate in formation programs meant to teach the faith, expand the ministry of the congregation, and live the Gospel.

I WANT TO BELIEVE IT WAS THE ADVERTISING

During the month of November the local high schools held food drives to benefit the Food Bank of Northwest Louisiana. Students took non-perishable goods to school with them for donation, and to give them incentive, they competed with each other to see which school could donate the largest number of pounds. For the third consecutive year Caddo Magnet High was the winner. Everything about this seems commendable, until you look at the numbers. In 2015 CMH collected around 15,000 pounds of food. In 2016 the students collected 7,777 pounds. In 2017 they collected between 2,000 and 3,000. And yet, that school continued to be the winner of the competition.

What does that say about the state of our economy? What does it say about the mindset of our population regarding caring for those in need? It is my prayer that the economy has not taken such a hard hit that the general public in Shreveport cannot afford to give to help the hungry. It is equally my prayer that the general population in our fair city is not becoming apathetic toward the plight of those less fortunate. I am hoping that the folk in charge of advertising this program became lax, thinking that because they do this every year that everyone knows about it and therefore they don't have to advertise it as much. But I honestly don't know what happened.

I do know that as Christians it is our responsibility to fill such needs in our community. Whatever caused this disturbing trend toward less giving in this one area, we have the ability to make a difference by helping to make up the difference. By looking outside ourselves and our immediate families and circumstances, we can see the needs in our communities.

We can notice the neighbor who needs help getting the garbage cans to the curb and provide some assistance. We can see the family whose children don't have decent shoes and help them out. We can send extra food in our children's lunches so they can share with their friends who are hungry. We can give coats to the Gift of Warmth program, drive for the Meals on Wheels program, put meals in the freezer for the Filling in the Gaps program. We can grow vegetables for hungry people in our community.

We can keep our eyes open for opportunities to show our love for our neighbors, to care for our community, and to welcome others into our lives. Thank-you to all of you for the many things you do to improve the community in which we live. Thank-you for remembering that the Episcopal Church welcomes us all.
