

2013 Senior Warden Report

Growth of St. James during 2013 cannot adequately be measured by the number of people sitting in the pews. Members of St. James were not sedentary group this year, but were agents of action for Christ, sharing His love in countless ways. To comprehend the growth that took place during 2013 one must consider the comprehensive manner in which the church fulfilled its mission to bring Christ to the world through a ministry of service to others. Stated succinctly, throughout 2013 St. James was a powerful testament of God's grace.

The church's members ministered to the needs of its community and beyond in numerous ways. Examples include the continuing involvement of members in the St. Luke's Medical Ministry and Kairos, the first-time gift of backpacks to Forest Hill Elementary children, the back-breaking work in the community garden, and the courageous efforts of the ladies who walked in the Susan G. Komen 3-Day for the Cure Walk.

St. James supported many other worthy causes and activities: Destination Imagination, Cursillo, Box Tops for Education, Catholic Charities, The Firecracker 5K, Episcopal



Relief and Development, The Fuller Center for Housing, Heart of Hope, Meals on Wheels, Mustard Seed Babies, Oklahoma hurricane victims, Relay for Life, and the Philadelphia Center, just to name a few. Individuals organized the community Halloween event— Trunk or Treat, went on a mission trip to Africa, ministered at Summerfield Estates, participated in Vacation Bible School, delivered Thanksgiving meals, bought and delivered Christmas gifts to the needy, and participated in the Purchased-Not for Sale ministry.

Memorial Committee 2012

This committee was formed years ago when the present church building was being constructed. Most of the furnishings, including pews and the altar rail, were purchased by this committee and its funds.

In the early 2000's this committee elected to move its funds into a separate account, taking the donations out of the general operating fund of the church. When donations and monetary gifts are received into the general operating fund, the accountant issues a check to the memorial fund.

Besides the church furnishings this committee has purchased parts of the current organ and the organ plaque, the windows in the columbarium and the designation plaque, the bench in the columbarium, prayer books, the benches used by the acolytes and Eucharistic ministers, a new Gospel book, pew candles, altar vases, candle holders and a Paschal candle. Recently, new altar linens were added to this list.

⁶ 2013 began with our annual Mardi Gras Ball held in the Parish Hall on January 12 from 7-11. The ECW set up and decorated for the event on January 9. After expenses, the ECW made \$400.00 for the event. Mattie Mosley and Kathy Watkins coordinated the event.

• On February 27 during Lent, the ECW again hosted and provided food for the annual Southern • Hills Ecumenical Service and Luncheon which was well attended by over 100 participants. Our • famous homemade vegetable soup, sandwiches and cookies were enjoyed by all.

On May 10 and 11, 2013, a group of our women participated in a retreat held at Five Points Lodge in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

[×] Our first official business meeting of the year was held on September 1, 2013 on Sunday morning in the Parish Hall. Seventeen [×] women were present, which was a good number, so it was decided to continue meeting at this time on the first Sunday of the [×] month. The only problem is that choir members cannot attend, but we hope they will still give input. Tina Vinson was elected [×] President by acclamation. Several suggestions were made for fund raising activities for the future. Tina volunteered to take [×] over the leadership of the Mardi Gras ball to be held January 25, 2014.

The ECW continued meeting in October, November and December of 2013 with good attendance. Some of the topics of discussion and expenditure included the purchase of two new large skillets for the kitchen and the purchase of blinds for the Garrett-Hall Building. Mattie Mosley suggested the ECW pay for fruit baskets to be delivered to the elderly/ ill St. James parishioners for Christmas. Other projects in which ECW members were involved included the "Truck or Trunk" flea market held on Oct. 5 and the "Trunk or Treat" on Halloween. Tina Vinson has made a display for the Parish Hall which reflects ECW projects.

2013 Altar Guild Report

The Altar is considered the most sacred part of the Church. Before it, we are baptized, confirmed, married, and buried. Around it, we gather to worship and offer God love, praise, and thanks. It is central to the celebration of our faith, the celebration of Holy Communion. The preparation and care of the Lord's table is a privilege and an honor, an offering of time and service of love. The work is done quietly and inconspicuously and brings a special closeness to God. Members of the Altar Guild recognize that their ministry is special, and offer their service with love and devotion to the Lord.

St. James currently has four Altar Guild teams. Each team serves for a two week period and is responsible for altar preparations for all services during that time. Responsibilities are shared so that all team members

do not have to be at every service. Each team develops their own system of sharing responsibilities.

Altar "cleaning" is scheduled on the first Sunday of each month at 9:00 a.m. Silver and brass items are polished and supplies are inventoried. Occasionally this is changed due to special holiday preparations.

Admission into S. James' Altar Guild is open to all members of the church and training can be provided at any time—love of the Lord and reverence for His table are the only requirements. — Kelly Parker.

The electronic sign is still providing the neighborhood with an insight as to what is happening at St. James. An attempt is always being made to let them know what we are doing and extending an invitation for them to join us.

In the sanctuary, we are still recording Sermons every Sunday available on the Web Site, <u>www.stjames-shreveport.org</u> for your listening. Not only are these sermons for your enjoyment, but our hopes are that non-parishioners are getting to experience the wonderful job Morgan does in spreading the Word. The website also offers information about our parishservice times, an electronic copy of the newsletter, and information about upcoming events.

We are still offering a peek at our service over the internet. It is intended to give you a sense of comfort when you are at home sick or have been unable to make it to church. 

Cursillo: A look into the History and Meaning of the Weekend Retreat

Cursillo, (pronounced: coor-SEE-oh) a Spanish word meaning "a short course", is a movement within the Church intended to help Christians know God's love and grace and to help Christians discover and live out their personal vocations in the world. Cursillo helps to renew and deepen Christian commitment. Some say Cursillo provides an important learning experience which causes many to feel like newly-made Christians with a purpose and with support. Everyone's experience is a little different.



When you ask a Cursillista about Cursillo and they won't tell you about the weekend, it is because it is hard to explain; it must be experienced. Cursillo is not a weekend of definites but a weekend of endless possibilities in our

Christian walk. Each person that attends Cursillo takes away something different from the experience. Cursillo is not a secret society, however, some of the events of the weekend are best kept under wraps until they are actually experienced.

Lay people conduct the weekend with two or three members of the clergy functioning as spiritual advisors. The weekend consists of a series of 15 talks, all linked together like links in a chain. Some talks are given by clergy and some are presented by lay team members. There is time for one-on-one spiritual direction with the clergy. There are arts and crafts! There is Food! Food! Food! And Music! Music! Music! A lot is packed into three days.

All confirmed adults or adults pursuing confirmation in the Episcopal Church may attend a Cursillo weekend. There is no cost to attend. Accommodations are made for anyone who is unable to do a lot of walking and provisions are made for special diets. Cursillo weekends are scheduled in the fall and spring. The next scheduled weekend is April 10–13, 2014 and the fall weekend will be October 23–26, 2014. Arrival at Camp Hardtner is between 5:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M. on Thursday evening, returning home Sunday evening.

Prayerfully consider attending a Cursillo weekend. No matter where you are on your spiritual journey, Cursillo has something to offer.

Community Garden Committee Report 2013

I am happy to report that our St. James garden continues to flourish and grow in size, scope and vision due to the large number of individuals providing help at all levels. I want to thank especially our parishioners who have supplied our leaves, pine straw, and labor to make this endeavor not only possible but successful. St. James is now one of the gardens that people in Caddo Parish are visiting to get ideas for starting their own gardens.

Early in the year we added two beds to our existing ones to now make for a total of four beds. Once again, Matt Parker provided the help we needed to dig them. Pat Parker supplied and spearheaded the planting of most of the beds along with help from committee members Kathy Deal, Dave Caporossi. He started a winter garden with some of the beds this year, planting broccoli, greens and onions. Our church and the Southern Hills community enjoyed the "fruits" of our labor. The garden produced a large amount of beautiful tomatoes, yellow squash, bell peppers, jalapenos, okra and basil. We tried watermelon and cantaloupe again but they have not done as well. I think it's a unanimous decision that our tomatoes were the "belle of the ball" this year. People came in droves to get them. They disappeared as soon as they were ripe.

We were happy to hear that several of our neighbors, including Hope House, Heart of Hope, Summerfield Estates, and other retirement centers, enjoyed the fresh produce along with our parishioners and other hungry individuals. Lois Maberry and Lorain Thrash delivered produce to several locations in the Southern Hills area.



Later in the year Dave Caporossi spearheaded a committee of individuals including Tina Vinson, Jnanne Zepeda, and Pat Parker to secure a \$1200 grant with the Northwest Louisiana Master Gardener Association. It will provide money to expand the garden, provide a longer-lasting border, and in-ground plumbing to help with the ease and mechanics of watering the garden consistently.

We have a vision to continue to expand our garden, provide for better access to it, and create an adjacent seating area to provide a respite for those working in the garden—or just a place for anyone to come and sit in peace to enjoy God's doing.

St. Luke's mobile van has been blessed by St. James in many ways. Many parishioners serve as volunteers including Jimmy and Kathy Deal, Lonnie Howard, B J Pritchard, Dr. Wain Thompson, Janie Parker, Holly Johnson, Ron and Lois Maberry, Rory Fitzpatrick and I hope I did not forget someone. Melanie Winkler has been hired to help in the office one day a week and has blessed the ministry with cleaner work services and more organ-



ized client files. The Outreach Committee also funds the Van and without contributions like that we would not be able to do all we do. The Van has expanded to be serving individuals in the Downtown area of Shreveport to the Homeless 3 times each month, Cedar Grove, Highland, Allendale, Vivian, Oil City, Minden, Mansfield, Benton and other areas when asked. We are currently doing 8-12 missions each month and saw almost 1000 individuals in 2013.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2013

During 2013, the St. James Vestry continued to contribute 3% of each month's ingathering for the Outreach Program. This averaged about \$400.00 per month. The Outreach Committee wants to express our deepest gratitude to the Vestry for continuing to be as giving and supportive to Outreach, as the money and support is desperately needed.

The 2013 Outreach Contributions/Recipients were as follows:

<u>April 2013</u>

Destination Imagination's class mentored by Linda Endicott was given \$250 to help cover expenses for their trip.

Rory Fitzpatrick was given \$100 to help cover his expenses for Destination Imagination as well.

I2D (intent to Distribute) and Project ING (Investing in Growth) was approved for 3300 per quarter in working with the housed homeless program. 300 was sent in April to cover 1^{st} quarter.

St. Luke's Mobile Ministry was approved for \$300 per quarter and a check was presented for \$300 to cover 1st quarter.

Gift card was purchased in the amount of \$100 to help out someone in need.

June 2013

Check for \$300 sent to I2D (Intent to Distribute) and ING (Investing in Growth) for 2^{nd} quarter appropriation.

Check for \$300 was sent to St. Luke's Mobile Ministry for 2nd quarter appropriation.

July 2013

\$300 was sent to St. Luke's Mobile Ministry for 3rd quarter appropriation. \$300 was sent to I2D/ING for 3rd quarter appropriation.

August/September 2013

School supplies and clothes were purchased for a girl at Keithville Middle school requested by Catholic Charities - \$143.48.

Clothes and school supplies were purchased for a boy - \$147.24.

Back Pack Program for Keithville Middle School and another local school -\$845.61. A donation of \$100 went towards this distribution from a parishioner making the total spent on this program \$945.61.

Electric bill paid for a person in need - \$199.93. Parishioners also supplied this person with household items and food.









October 2013

4th guarter tithe was sent to St. Luke's Mobile Ministry in the amount of \$300. 4th quarter tithe was sent to I2D/ING in the amount of \$300. Shoes and a jacket were purchased for a little boy in need - \$35.77. Helping Hands Tree Purchased - \$51.34. \$12.89 left over for stamps.

November 2013

\$150 was given by a parishioner to help the Outreach Committee supply over 50 families with a nice Thanksgiving Dinner. Outreach purchased containers for the food as well.

Helping Hands Tree was put up to support the needs of our local community. There were over 10 items for Renzi Center as well as 5 families in need for Christmas that were taken from the tree. The tree will be ongoing for needs of the community throughout the year.

Outreach gave a Christmas party for Project ING – funds were spent in the amount of \$330.91 for food and gifts.

Outreach supported the I2D Christmas bags again this year by purchasing the majority of the items for the 75 bags for the homeless - \$ 862.35 was spent. Items were socks, scarves, underwear, hats, fleece blankets, candy, bags, socks and undershirts for men and women.

December 2013

\$500 was sent to the Philippines Episcopal Relief in light of the tragedy that occurred there – another parishioner matched the Outreach donation.

Outreach supported/funded the recent Beth Moore Bible Study - \$195.43.

Outreach and church members supported the filling of the Christmas bags in the Parish Hall on December 19th as well as supporting the distributing of the bags on December 22nd. There was a great turnout and we hope to continue every year.

A great time was had by all at the Project ING Christmas party held on the 20th.



The Goodwill project continued throughout the year taking in donations of clothes, etc. We receive a \$10 voucher for every 5 bags collected - over 100 bags were collected which equated to around \$200! These certificates were given to the Hope House, I2D, and Project ING throughout the year to distribute to those in need so they could purchase things at Goodwill.

Maintaining the food barrel for the Salvation Army has still been something that the parishioners of St. James have been faithful to support each month as well.





The Relay for Life mentored by Kathy Watkins brought in over \$2,300.00 for St. James & St. Matthias. St. James participation was way down this year, unfortunately.

Outreach and St. James parishioners supported the Prison Ministry Cookie Bake several times during the year which was also a huge success.





Meals on Wheels is still going strong and we thank those who help support this mission.

A total of <u>\$6,174.95</u> was spent throughout 2013 on various outreach projects (listed above). As of the end of December, 2013, there is \$3,466.36 in the Outreach Committee fund. November and December contribution was not available at the time of this report.

KAIROS and KAIROS OUTSIDE Annual Report 2013

Kairos is an interdenominational ministry devoted to bringing God's grace and love to incarcerated men, women and youth, and to establish ongoing Christian Communities within correctional facilities. An affiliated ministry, Kairos Outside, has the purpose of demonstrating God's grace and love through Christian support for women who have relatives or friends who are or who have been incarcerated. Locally, Kairos volunteers serve the David Wade

Correctional Center near Homer, LA. Additionally, West Louisiana Kairos Outside carries out retreat weekends at Camp Hardtner. Volunteers and support for both ministries regularly come from our St. James Parish family. The Kairos and Kairos outside weekends are lay-led and patterned after three-day weekends such as Cursillo or Walk to Emmaus, but are designed to address the spiritual needs and concerns of the incarcerated or their loved ones affected by their incarceration and to provide meaningful support. Obviously, the men incarcerated at David Wade suffer isolation, rejection by family, and are often seen as outcasts from society. Many are not aware that women truly serve time right along with their loved ones.
They are humiliated and de-valued through interaction with the federal and state penal system and even by the judgment of their community and peers. They suffer, not because they have

 done something wrong, but because they love and support someone who has. It is truly heartbreaking to hear some of the stories of Kairos and Kairos Outside participants.

It takes the work of many hands and feet to carry out a Kairos or Kairos Outside weekend to

It takes the work of many hands and feet to carry out a Kairos or Kairos Outside weekend to
 make this special time what God would have it to be. Kairos weekends are brought to David

• Wade two times per year, in March and September. The Kairos weekend is typically staffed by

- 40 men who actually go inside the prison and a support team of 8-12 men and women who
- cook and provide prayer support. Similarly, a Kairos Outside team consists of 24 women and
- 6 to 8 men, with the men serving as the prayer cook team and truly show the spirit of service to the female guests. Both the Kairos and Kairos Outside weekends are presented without cost to any participant, so financial support is always an opportunity. However, the greatest opportunity for support is to actually serve on a weekend and doing so will truly enrich your life in more ways that you can imagine.

The next West Louisiana Kairos Outside weekend, Kairos Outside #28, is scheduled for May 2 - 4 at Camp Hardtner. There will be four team formation meetings held in Alexandria, and volunteers from the Shreveport area typically car pool to the team meetings. The dates for the meetings are February 15th, March 8th, March 28th-29th, and April 12th. 
As a result, St. James was very supportive of their efforts, and our Vestry encouraged them to use our facilities to host several fundraising events that allowed the ladies to participate in the 3-Day Walk in Dallas. They wish to thank everyone who assisted them, whether by spreading the word, making a purchase of their baked goods or meals, enjoying the game night they hosted, or joining them in Dallas as support crew for the walkers.

Following is an excerpt from Morgan's message in the November 2013 *Spirit of St. James*:

"We, the walkers, ended up raising over 3.3 million dollars for breast cancer research! In fact, the money we raised as a team (\$17,000) has already come back to our community! The St. Luke's medical van just received a grant from Susan G. Komen in the amount of \$19,000 to offer free clinical breast exams, patient education and to cover the costs of mammograms for referred patients.

In essence, the money we raised is already helping Shreveport/Bossier, Minden and Mansfield raise awareness for breast cancer and aid in early detection."


